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STRING QUARTET OPENS 1986-87 SERIES... With the music of Mozart, Shostakovich and Dvorak, the Governors State University String Quartet will open its 1986-87 series of free public concerts on Nov. 9 at 3:30 p.m. in the Music Recital Hall.

Participating in the String Quartet's opening performance will be **Donald Kramer**, guest clarinetist and adjunct faculty member at the university. Kramer will join the quartet in Mozart's *Clarinet Quintet in A Major*, K 581, which is the opening number of the program.

String Quartet No. 8, Op. 110 by Dmitri Shostakovich will be played by violinists Steven Bjella and Stephanie Goldman Meis, violist Rohert Shamo and cellist Alan Rostoker, followed by Antonin Dvorak's Two Waltzes, Op. 54, No. 1, 4.

The GSU String Quartet musicians are members of the adjunct faculty in music. Each has earned a distinguished reputation in Chicago music circles. The ensemble's repertoire ranges from traditional to contemporary, from Haydn and Boccherini to Ravel and Barber. During its first five seasons, the quartet played works by more than thirty composers.

Temple Anshe Sholom in Olympia Fields is sponsoring a series of Sunday afternoon concerts featuring the GSU String Quartet. Performances are scheduled for Nov. 2, Jan. 11, 1987 and April 12, 1987. They have also been invited to present a concert at Olivet Nazarene University in Kankakee on Nov. 6, the University of Illinois, Chicago in April of 1987 and the Third Unitarian Church of Oak Park on May 24, 1987.

According to **Bill Dodd**, executive director of University Advancement, "One of the quartet's goals is to reach out into the greater metropolitan Chicago area and even beyond. To assist them in this endeavor, The First Suburban Bank of Olympia Fields has made a generous grant to the GSU Foundation to help defray the cost of off-campus appearances."

FREE VIDEO SERIES OFFERED... Two movies will be shown during the fall trimester as part of the free film series sponsored by the Film and Video Society, a student organization at Governors State. Both films will be shown on Friday nights at 7:30 p.m., and there is no charge.

On Oct. 31 in Engbretson Hall, the popular cult movie, *The Rocky Horror Picture Show* will be shown. **John Wasserman** of the San Francisco *Chronicle* said, "It spoofs every monster film since *King Kong*, comic books, pulp detective mysteries, Dick and Jane, rock and roll, and sexual confusion."

Fanny and Alexander, an **Ingmar Bergman** film, is scheduled for Nov. 21. It will be shown in Room F1200 in the east wing of the university. Bergman set this humorous, nostalgic movie in turn-of-the-century Sweden. Growth and reconciliation are the themes illustrated by ten-year-old protagonist Alexander who struggles to understand a harsh adult world. Fanny, his older sister, is the catalyst who, in the end, helps him to realize the saving power of love. Newsweek magazine said, "Fanny and Alexander offers us a glimpse of earthly paradise...There's a little something for everyone in this..."

Refreshments will be served at intermission, and the public is welcome to attend.

GSU COSPONSORS CONFERENCE... The Northeastern Illinois Planning Commission (NIPC) and Governors State will sponsor the first Conference on the Cultural History of the Southern Suburbs which will be held Feb. 7, 1987 at First United Methodist Church in Harvey. **Dr. Larry McClellan**, chairman of the Division of Humanities and Social Sciences in the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS), will be conference moderator.

"The purpose of the conference," said Dr. McClellan, "is to enhance the understanding of the south suburban area's growth and development and to stimulate the use of that knowledge in the ongoing planning and decision-making that affect the future of the area.

"The focus of this conference will be the settlement of the south suburban area and the original and continuing roles played by immigrants, religious and ethnic groups, and other participants in community history."
