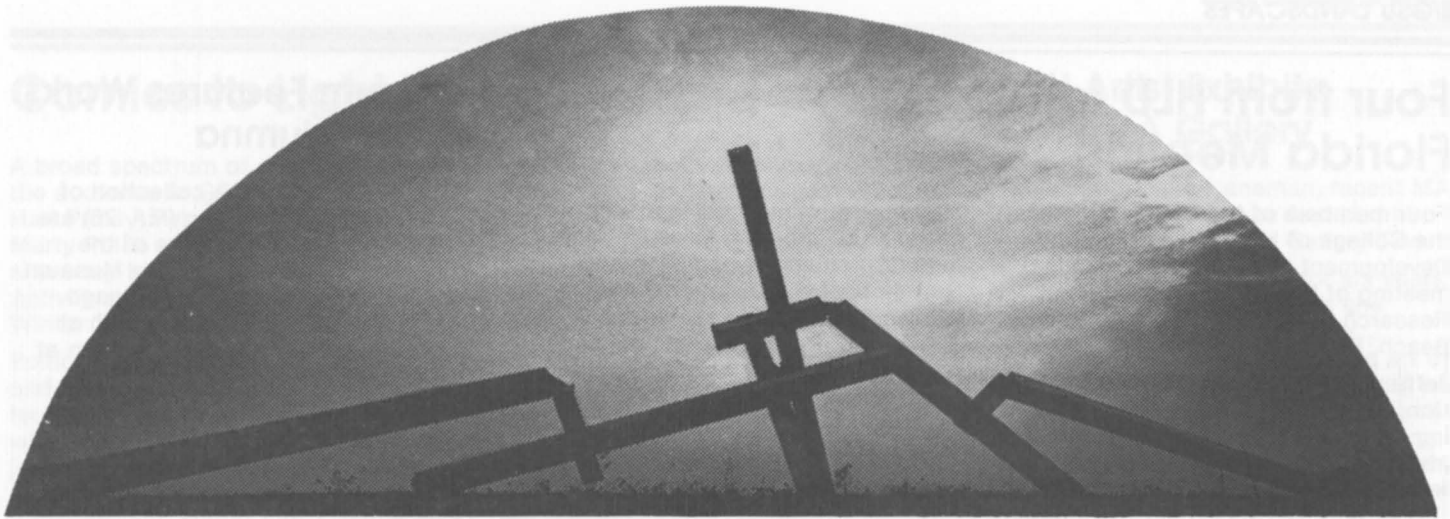

## Deming, Quality Control Expert, Here for Seminar

The American who introduced the statistical analysis methods to Japanese industry for quality control and productivity that has them leading the competition all over the world, will lead a seminar at GSU February 17. The event, sponsored by Special Programs and Continuing Education, is attracting wide interest.

W. Edwards Deming, called "The American Who Remade 'Made in Japan'" in an article by William Ringle in the prestigious magazine *Nation's Business*, has been termed "the founder of the third wave of the Industrial Revolution" by William E. Conway, chairman and president of the American conglomerate, Nashua Corporation. Industry in Japan acknowledges the statistician's part in their achievements annually when that country's industries give their own "Deming Award" to the Japanese manufacturer whose company has gained most in quality during the year. The Second Order Medal of the Sacred Treasure was bestowed on Deming by Emperor Hirohito for his contributions to Japan's economy.

At 80, Deming looks on a continuing career that spans 60 years, starting from his appointment as engineering instructor at the University of Wyom-

ing, his alma mater. His years in government service began in 1927 when he joined the Department of Agriculture as a mathematical physicist; twelve years later he transferred to the Bureau of the Census as an advisor in statistical sampling. In 1946, Deming began private consulting work and became a professor of statistics at NYU's Graduate School of Business Administration. He still teaches there as a professor emeritus.

A man of many talents, Deming has

written eight books, has been consultant to the departmental agencies of several foreign countries and still finds time to study musical theory and write liturgical music. He does not plan to retire. He is quoted in *Nation's Business* as saying, "I put in a 12-hour day, and I am not thinking of reducing that figure."

## Museum Features Works of GSU Alumna

Some 51 poems from a collection of work by Mildred Johnson (MA '76) are to be exhibited as a feature of the Black Esthetics exhibit at the Museum of Science and Industry in Chicago. Johnson, who delivered a speech at the Tenth Anniversary Convocation at GSU, has included as part of her display the poem she read at that event titled "Poet of the People."

After her graduation, Johnson served for four years as an administrator at Olive-Harvey City College, first as director of academic skills and then as director of testing. She writes for *Ebony* Jr., a children's magazine and also directs a children's theatre, which she first established in 1963.

While a student at GSU, Johnson worked under Temmie Gilbert (CAS), and toured the southern suburbs with the University's Children's Theatre. She states that her own learning experiences here have helped to make her an unofficial student recruiter, and says that all the people in her office at Olive-Harvey eventually became GSU students.

The Black Esthetics exhibit will continue at the Museum of Science and Industry until February 7.

## Comics to Light Up MRH

A broad spectrum of comic art awaits the audience in GSU's Music Recital Hall Friday, February 5, at 8:00 p.m. Marty Pollio and Paul Zimmerman share top billing in the first Student Activity sponsored special event of the Winter Trimester.

Pollio specializes in mime, juggling and circus techniques. Zimmerman terms himself a "fool", which covers a wide variety of talents, such as conjuror and clown, along with the mime and juggling art he shares with his partner.

Pollio has appeared with such headliners as Muddy Waters and Marty Robbins. He has toured with Will B. Abies Baggy Pants & Co., a vaudeville-burlesque show, and soloed at Opryland, USA, and appeared at comedy clubs in New York, Los Angeles and Orlando. He lists his "odd habits" as magic, fire eating, nose and chin balancing, rope walking (slack and tight), tumbling and unicycling.

Zimmerman, not yet 25 years old, has moved from "opener" at comedy clubs to headliner. After opening for veteran comedian Pat Paulsen last July at Sir Laffalots in Columbus, Ohio, the *Citizen-Journal* said that "he alone is a compelling reason to get up to Laffalots." He was brought back as the main attraction in November. He has played at more than 20 college campuses in California, Wisconsin, North Dakota and Illinois since 1978 and has headlined frequently at Chicago Comedy Showcase.

He studied at Valley Studio School of Mime and Dell 'Arte School of Mime and Comedy in California.

Admission to this special event is \$2 for GSU faculty and staff, members of the GSU Alumni Association and senior citizens; \$3 for the general public and \$1 for children under twelve.

## GSU Artist Exhibits at YWCA Gallery

The work of Julie Haneman, recent MA recipient at GSU, will be featured at the Park Forest YWCA's Gallery Two.

Haneman, who taught art for six years in District 149 in Dolton says she brings to her work some of the mysticism she has sensed in the art of the North American Indian. Many of her pieces are what she calls "icons" and she blends into her thought-provoking art layers of fabric and rice paper with canvas, often sewing these together or fringing them to create her effects.

Included in the unusual exhibit is one of Haneman's latest works, "Tucumcari," an oil which she describes as a two-dimensional altar. The YWCA Gallery Two exhibit will open Friday, March 5, 7 to 9 p.m. and continue through the month.
