Together singer and veteran performer **Frankie Avalon** and comedian **Tom Dreesen** will have you clapping, singing and laughing in a show that promises to be a crowd-pleaser.

We all remember Avalon as the crooner from the California beach movies, but his talents are many and varied, and he'll entertain as a singer, impersonator, trumpet player and dancer.

And Dreesen, the guy who left Harvey but didn't forget where his roots are, comes back to be the funny man that he always is. With jokes and comedy done in good taste, Dreesen will have you re- membering your pals and good times of the past, as well as poking good- humored fun at social, political and ethnic/racial topics.

This dinner/entertainment program begins with cocktails at 7 p.m. at the Matteson Holiday Plaza Complex. ## String Quartet schedules May 14 on-campus concert

The GSU String Quartet will perform works by Ludwig van Beethoven, Igor Stravinsky and Benjamin Britten during a May 14 program in the Sherman Music Recital Hall.

The concert begins at 3:30 p.m. and tickets are \$5 per person.

Beethoven's "String Quartet in E-Flat Major, Op. 74" will open the program. The work in four movements is nicknamed "The Harp," although musicians frown on that usage because they feel it trivializes the piece.

The first movement uses arpeggiated plucked strings. The adagio affects a very masculine kind of tenderness, believed to be a reflection of the composer's

will allow teleconferencing and satellite productions in the theater.

The event will be the second annual fundraiser conducted by the Foundation as part of the Center's construction campaign. Last year singer Helen Reddy entertained GSU donors.

# Pat Fares leaves GSU after 13 years at UPS

Do you want your paper coated or uncoated? Vellum or bond? Seventy pound? Do you want it in yellow, blue, white or green? Did you want black or blue ink? Do you want your brochures folded, trimmed or will they be scored?

And I suppose you want this job done immediately?

Of course! And it was because Pat Fares was able to order, schedule and prepare work to our specifications and needs that we came

to appreciate the operation he ran at the University Print Shop.

Print Shop will go on running after Pat's April 30 retirement as its superintendent, and although Pat swears he won't miss it one bit, he's probably fibbing. After more than 50 years in the business, even Pat admits he's got ink in his blood ("and on my hands, too" he joked).

Curiosity may have killed the cat, but in Pat's case it was curiosity that landed him his first job.

"There was a printing business in Chicago Heights not far from where I lived, and as a boy I would look in the door when I'd go by," he recalled. "I was fascinated by the equipment, and so the owner hired me as a letter press apprentice for \$1.50 a week. I'd go and work after school and he taught me all the fine points of letter press printing."

After graduation printing became Pat's livelihood. He moved from job to job learning all he could in the Chicago area's printing houses. During the last 50 years Pat has been on all sides of the business. He's done letter press and offset printing, he's sold printing, he's planned printing and he's been a supervisor for printing businesses.

He says he never stayed at a job for more than five years. "I always got antsy and had to move on. That was until I came here to GSU. I've been here 13 years," he said.

When Pat arrived in March 1976 GSU had three major pieces of equipment. The University Print Shop was "just an embryo" of a printing operation. It was Pat that transformed it into a business to handle all of GSU's needs from the simple jobs like copying memos, to the more complex jobs of posters, brochures, commencement invitations, concert programs and the like. Even the "University Chefs Cookbook" was a job handled by our on-campus print shop.

Each printing job requires special equipment and Pat's expertise made him the perfect superintendent to transform the university's printing operations. He purchased seven additional pieces of equipment each piece giving UPS capabilities for very specific things.

Pat also knew everything about paper, and his contacts with Chicago paper houses has helped him keep abreast of changes in the industry and to keep stocks on hand, or get quick orders as needed. The routine paper supplies he can order in bulk at cheaper rates through the Illinois Educational Consortium.

Our work orders have kept the University Print Shop crew of seven extremely busy, and Pat says "most of the time we could do with more help" but budget restrictions have kept him from getting approval for additional workers.

So after all these years in the business, what kind of retirement is Pat looking forward to? "Retirement at this time is going to be what I want it to be," he says firmly, "not what my wife says I should do, or my friends or family. I'm going to decide for myself what to do

### **GSU staff members participate in counseling meet**

GSU staff members recently participated in the 1989 annual convention of the American Association for Counseling and Development in Boston.

Presenting workshops were Peggy Woodard, counselor in Student Development, whose topic was "Development of an Inservice Counseling Model to Upgrade Skills of Employees Required to Complete Training." The program focused on Peggy's and counselor Pam Zener's work in preparing employees of Stauffer Chemical Company in Chicago Heights with re-entry skills they could use for a retraining program.

Dr. Diane Kjos, professor of counseling, coordinated a program on software and wrote reviews for participants on a counseling accountability series and a summary on uses of counseling administration.

Other participants were Dr. Judy Cooney and Dr. Michael Lewis, professors in the counseling division, and Dr. Judy Lewis, a professor in the College of Health Professions.

### **Another GSU staffer elected to local political post**

Congratulations! Mary Konkell, head of the cataloging department in the University Library, was elected to the Richton Park Library Board. She was first appointed to the board in 1986 to fill a vacancy, and shortly thereafter was elected to complete the term. With her election in April she will be serving her first six-year term.

With Mary's election she is now a candidate for membership on the Suburban Library Systems Board.

### **Dr. Green returns to U.S. after speaking to Italians**

"Si, si Italia t'amo," said Dr. Paul Green, professor of public administration after his recent trip to Italy.

Green was invited to speak at Centro Italiano di Formazioni Europea in Rome on March 30. The group is spearheading the development of the "European Community" in which 13 western European nations will unite as one for purposes of commerce and cultural exchanges.

The professor's topic was "American Federalism" to give the Europeans a glimpse of how our 50 states work as one national union, and how federalism changed during the Reagan Administration from a strong central government to one that gave greater responsibilities to the states.

Green met with students from the University of Roma and has invited several who will be studying in the U.S. as Fulbright Scholars to lecture at GSU.

### **Jay Boersma works on display at Chicago center**

Now through June 10 it's the works of Jay Boersma on display at the Chicago Public Library Cultural Center, 78 E. Washington St., Chicago.

Yes, our photography professor is one of 30 photographers whose works are on display as part of the "Changing Chicago" exhibit funded by the Focus/Infinity Fund. He was selected from 175 entrants for this project.

His 20 photos on exhibit reflect the changing south suburban Chicago landscape. "The entire visual texture of the southern suburbs is in a constant state of flux --an enormous and continuous transition from one thing into another. And this transition is photographically fascinating," he said.

In all, Boersma submitted 115 photos. The remaining 95 will become part of the Chicago Historical Society's archives. Boersma also has five photos in the "Changing Chicago" exhibit book.

It was believed that the final piece opens with music inspired from Russian liturgy. Stravinsky called the final 20 bars of the piece "some of my best music of the time (1914)."

The Quartet concludes with "String Quartet No. 1" by Britten.

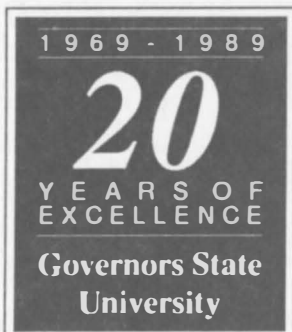
