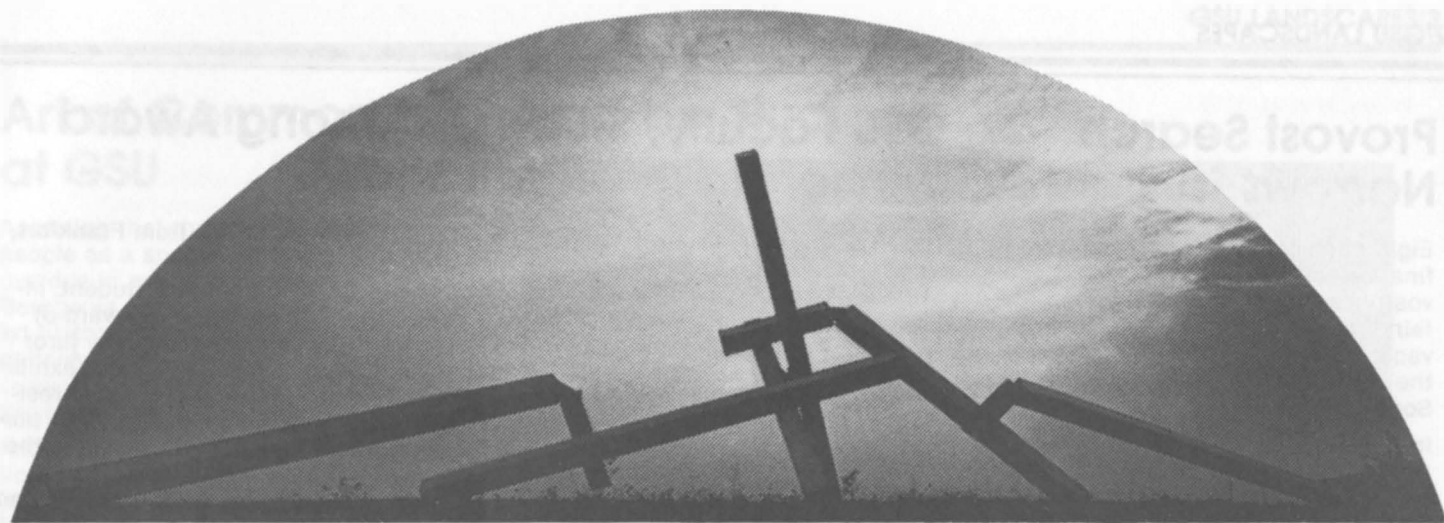

GSU's Sculpture Park Represented in Mayor Byrne's Show

One of the 14 sculptures in the Nathan Manilow Sculpture Park at GSU, and large color photographs of the other 13 will be on display in "Mayor Byrnes' Mile of Sculpture," being held at Navy Pier through May 29.

The sculpture featured at the GSU exhibit booth is "Outgrown Pyramid," by world famous Illinois sculptor Richard Hunt. Hunt is president of the Chicago Sculpture Society, which is co-sponsoring the exhibit with the city of Chicago. Photographs in the exhibit of the other sculptures in the Nathan Manilow Park are the work of ICC's Richard Burd and his staff. The exhibit was designed and built by Ken Pennington, ICC.

More than 50 works are on display in the free exhibit. They were shipped to Chicago's Navy Pier from museums, galleries and directly by the artists from all over the nation.

"The inclusion of the works from our Manilow Sculpture Park will enhance the already growing international reputation of the collection and focus new attention on the arts in the southern suburbs," William H. Dodd, chief executive officer of the GSU Foundation, which manages the Manilow collection, declares. "During the first week, it was seen by thousands of art dealers and buyers from around the world who were attending another exhibit, Art 1982 Chicago, which was held at the southwest end of Navy Pier," he added.

Provost Search Narrows to Eight

Eight candidates have been chosen for final selection for the position of Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs at GSU. Dr. Curtis L. McCray will vacate the post on June 1 to assume the presidency of the University of South Florida.

Interviewing of the eight will continue through May and extend into the first half of June. Dr. Jerry M. Anderson, currently Senior Consultant for the ASSCU Center for Planned Change was interviewed May 10-11. Following Anderson that week was Dr. Ronald L. Applebaum, Dean of the School of Humanities, California State University-Long Beach, May 12-13.

This week, May 17-21, Dr. Marvin El De Boer, Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of Faculty at the University of Central Arkansas, and Dr. Raymond S. Wilkes, Dean of the Campus at Ohio University-Lancaster have been interviewed.

Monday and Tuesday, May 24-25, Dr. Harvey Irlen, Vice President for Curriculum and Instruction, Oakton Community College, Des Plaines will be interviewed followed on May 26-27 by Dr. David V. Curtis, Vice President for Academic Affairs at Lewis University, Lockport and former executive associate to the president of GSU.

Dr. Charles M. Temple, Executive Vice Chancellor/Provost from the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga will be interviewed on Thursday and Friday June 3-4. The following week is set for Dr. Robert L. Milam, Dean of the College of Business and Public Administration, GSU, Thursday and Friday June 10-11.

GSU Faculty, Students Among Award Winners in Regional Show

The Northern Indiana Art Association's 39th Annual Salon Show is currently in place in the gallery at 8317 Calumet Avenue, Munster, Indiana until May 29. Featured in the exhibit are eight works of six faculty members and students from GSU. Juror of the show was E. John Bullard, Director of the New Orleans Museum of Art.

The artists and the titles of their works are:

John Payne, professor, GSU Sculptor-in-Residence, two metal floor sculptures, *Not for Cocktails Only No. 1 (New Age of Games); Not for Cocktails Only No. 2 (New Age of Games)*, (Award of Merit).

Judith Deibig Lalaria, professor, Printmaking/Design, a lithograph, *Do Not Bend, Fold, Spindle or Mutilate*.

Margi Hafer, graduate student, a soft sculpture, *Fascinatin' Sadie* (Award of Merit), and *Victorian Victoria*, a mixed media sculpture. Hafer, who earned the MA from GSU winter, '82 currently teaches ceramics at Thornton Com-

munity College. She is from Frankfort, Illinois.

Thomas Stubbs, graduate student, intaglio etching, *First Light*, (Award of Merit). This work was named by juror Bullard as the "best print in the exhibition." Stubbs, a Chicago Heights resident, was also the recipient of two purchase awards earlier this spring in the Illinois Regional Print Show-1982 for *First Light* and was further represented in that exhibit with his collagraph print, *The Apparition*.

Marcia Glesener, graduate student, intaglio etching, *Dragons High and Low*. Glesener, of Steger, is affiliated with the Homewood/Flossmoor Park District and the Irons Oakes Foundation.

Jacquelyn Ruttinger, graduate student, acrylic painting, *Harbinger*. Ruttinger was also selected for the Illinois Regional Print Show-1982 and exhibited her intaglio etching *Luminous Night*. The Crete resident recently was represented in the Michiana Biennial Show where she received an award of merit.

Public Policy Workshop on Vocational Education

GSU's Institute for Public Policy and Administration (BPA), will conduct a workshop on "The Future of Vocational Education in Illinois," 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., Monday, May 24.

Such topics as likely resources for vocational education programs in Illinois in the 80s; priorities for available funding sources; what policy directions must be strengthened and changed; and how the New Federalism may govern this aspect of education will be discussed.

The featured speaker is Professor Izaak Wirsup of the University of Chicago who will deliver a paper on "Education and National Survival." Among the other presenters are state Representatives James F. Keane and Terry A. Steczo and John S. Washburn of the Illinois State Board of Education, manager of research and development, Department of Adult, Vocational and Technical Education.

Art of Common People to be Studied at GSU

Asserting that the art of the common people as a special category is long overdue in academic circles, Arthur Bourgeois (CAS), will initiate a special art history class to help overcome the deficiency during the final half of the current Spring/Summer Trimester at Governors State University.

Entitled "American Art: The Folk Traditions," the course will highlight domestic architecture and furnishings of Spanish, English, French and Dutch colonies in the New World and subsequent regional, ethnic and folk traditions.

Special lectures will range from Shaker furniture and Pennsylvania German contributions to contemporary expressions of art. Students will research and make presentations on such diverse topics as weather vanes, tobacco store sculpture, carousel figures, quilting, stoneware, tin, costumes and toys.

Classes will meet from 10:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. on Mondays and Thursdays from June 24 to August 12, and students may earn two or three hours of college credit. For further information, contact Bourgeois at extension 2309.

The Executive Management Council has approved, on an experimental basis, the recommendation of the Civil Service Senate for "summer work hours."

Civil service employees currently assigned to work from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. will work from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. beginning June 1, 1982. On September 7, 1982, the 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. work shift will be resumed.

Offices that operate until 8:00 p.m. with civil service employees assigned to work from 11:30 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. will allow those employees to begin work at noon and end at 8:00 p.m. (with a thirty-minute unpaid meal break) beginning June 1, 1982. On September 7, 1982, the 11:30 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. work shift will be resumed.

The "summer work hours" are mandatory for civil service staff and supervisors are requested to give the employees assigned to their unit reasonable notice of this change in work shifts. Employees assigned to shifts other than the two mentioned above are not affected by the shift changes.
