"The Alumni Association Board," Burghardt continued, "has structured this scholarship to be the most prestigious award of all the endowed scholarships. The board feels the recipient will be the


most outstanding student on campus."

HOLDSTEIN, DEBORAH TURAC, MARIE **DR. HARRIET GROSS** — **IN THE NEWS...**Governors State University is, as almost everyone around here knows, a commuter institution of higher learning. **Dr. Harriet Gross** is, again as many people know, a professor of sociology at Governors State. Her area of specialization in the past half dozen or so years has been the study of commuter marriages.

What connection there is between these two facts is dubious, at best. But it does serve to introduce one of GSU's more active ambas-

sadors to the regions beyond "the region."

Ever since she earned her doctorate from University of Chicago in 1974, she has been active in publication circles and on the speaker's platform. But the vehicle most responsible for propelling her to prominence nationally has been the study of married couples who pursue separate careers in far-apart places.

Her first publication on this subject in 1980 was titled "Dual Career Couples Who Live Apart: Two Types. "The culmination of this activity was the publication in 1984 of a

book called Commuter Marriage: A Study in Work and Family (Guilford, New York), co-authored by fellow researcher Naomi Gerstel.

So, that is what one expects from a university professor—research, publication, professional meetings, etc. But when the subject of that research is fascinating, timely and perhaps controversial, it is made to order for the popular media—newspaper "lifestyle" sections, magazines and radio/TV talk shows.

Imagine yourself—a member of the Governors State University family—flying to some far-off place for a meeting or vacation. You pick up the *TWA Ambassador* magazine, flip through it and suddenly see an article by Dr. Harriet Gross of Governors State.

Or, perhaps you are travelling through the South and stop for lunch in Jackson, Mississippi of all places. You pick up a copy of the local newspaper, the *Clarion-Ledger*, and can't believe you are reading an article on commuting couples based on the work of your friend from GSU, Dr. Harriet Gross. You might be in any number of other places and pick up a copy of *USA Today*. Lo and behold, there she is, quoted time and time again in this article about people who want to stay married and still pursue separate careers in different places.

As you are coming back to the Chicago area, your car radio is tuned to Extension 720, hosted by Dr. Milton Rosenberg and beamed by superstation WGN to far-away places. He just happens to have as his guest our own Harriet Gross, talking about commuter marriages. Not long afterwards, she is on a nationally syndicated womens' TV talk show from the West Coast. And so the beat goes.

Of course, that isn't the full extent of Professor Gross's activities by far. She is the faculty director of the Women's Resource Center, a position which suits her well. (Another major area of research for years has been women's studies.) Since joining the Governors State University faculty in 1974, she has received six research faculty grants and numerous other awards. She is an active member of the American Sociological Association and the Midwest Sociological Society. There have been some 30 papers and articles in a wide variety of publications over the years and more than 20 presentations to professional and community organizations.

And each time, Harriet Gross has been letting the world know that there is such a place as Governors State University in University
