**GOVERNORS GENERAL HEALTH SERVICES...**Plans for a 200-bed capacity health service center for Park Forest South were announced on July 20. The \$12 million center is expected to be completed in three to five years. It will be located on 40 acres of land in Park Forest South, north of Steunkel Road and east of the Illinois Central near GSU's permanent campus. The proposed facility will be a teaching hospital and health care center. The new center is an extension of Rush-Presbyterian-St. Lukes Medical Center. Attending the brunch at which the announcement was made were BILL ENGBRETSON, KEITH SMITH, VIRGE PIUCCI, AL MARTIN and TED ANDREWS from GSU.
