JULY UNIVERSITY ASSEMBLY MEETING...At its July 27 meeting the Assembly approved a resolution specifying that a Presidential veto may be overridden and taken to the Board of Governors by a vote exceeding 3/4 of the those present and voting...a proposed Constitutional amendment calling for ejecting members of the Assembly who miss three consecutive meetings, or five in any one term, received its first reading. The heatedly debated amendment will be voted upon at the next Assembly meeting in September and, if approved by 2/3 of the Assembly, be sent to the Colleges for voting...defeated a motion requiring A & R to withhold diplomas until receipt of all achievement forms verifying completion of all credits (it was argued successfully that students were being saddled with an administrative responsibility).

...replacing Assembly members, TULSI SARAL was elected as CHLD representative in place of departing DELOPIS SAUNDERS and ELAINE STRAUSS replaced JOHN KIRKSEY who resigned from the Assembly as Civil Service Representative.

...the most significant proposals involved passage of proposals from the Standing Committee on Educational Policies and Programs (SCEPP) that would allow credit to be granted for work experience, already acquired skills, passage of professionally normed exams, or completion of other formal programs provided all of these relate to the competencies of a degree program...also passed and sent on to the President was a special admissions policy allowing 5% of all GSU students to be admitted without meeting current admission standards but possessing other qualifications...also passed for presidential action was the women's studies proposal calling for immediate appointment of a coordinator of women's studies who would be located in the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs. The implementation of an intercollegial program in women's studies with FY 74 funds would be through one of the existing colleges.

...approved was a proposal from SCEPP that minimum graduation credits be reduced from 124 to 120 for a bachelor's degree...also passed was a hotly contested motion that students get permission for overload registration from their College if previously enrolled but incomplete work plus new work exceeds 8 units...the August meeting of the University Assembly was canceled in favor of two meetings in September.

Effective August 1, BILL KATZ has been appointed Acting Dean of CHLD. His appointment was overwhelmingly recommended by the CHLD faculty to replace CHUCK WADE who has resigned. A Search Committee is now being organized to recommend a permanent Dean.

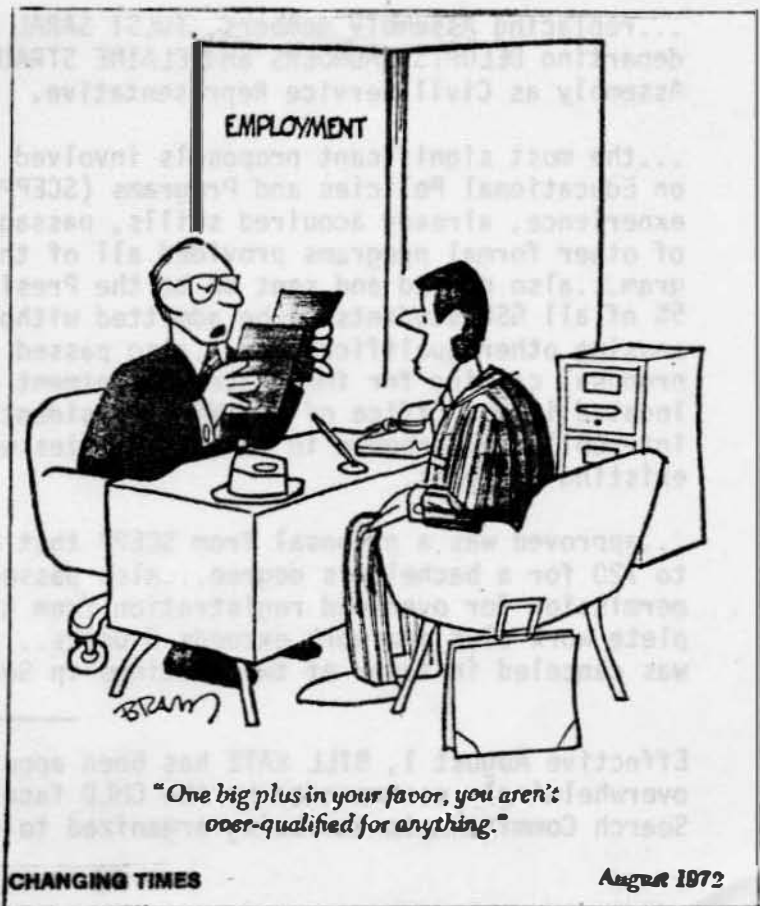
