

**FESTIVAL OF THE ARTS RETURNS IN FALL...** A major three-day Festival of the Arts, involving a wide variety of both professional and amateur performing and visual artists, is planned for Oct. 16 through 18 at the university, according to **Dr. Arthur Bourgeois,** chairperson of the Fine and Performing Arts Division of the College of Arts and Sciences.

Dr. Bourgeois notes, "We will once again offer local artists and students an opportunity to showcase their talents along with artists of national or international reputation."

The festival is being presented by the university as a free public service. Planning for more than 15 events is well under way.

Wawrzyniak**, assistant curate of St. Michael's Orthodox Mission in South Holland on Sept. 9. **Sister Jane Anthrop**, O.S.F., director of pastoral care at St. James Hospital in Chicago Heights, will discuss "Ministry to Cancer Patients and Their Families" on Sept. 16. On Sept. 23 a program entitled "Next to the Last Things" will be offered by the **Rev. Eugene P. Parnisari** of Legal Advocacy Services for Seniors, Catholic Charities, Naperville. Scheduled for Sept. 30 will be "Public Welfare in Illinois," presented by **Janet Kittlaus**, Public Welfare Coalition, Evanston.

The lectures are open to the public at no charge and participants may bring a lunch or purchase one from the cafeteria.

**FALL 1986 PLANNING CONFERENCE SCHEDULED**..."Telecommunications Technology and Continuing Education: the Identification and Development of University Priorities" is the topic for the Fall 1968 Planning Conference at the university, 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., Sept. 16. The program will feature a live video hook-up to Washington, D.C., and Portland, Ore., according to **Dr. Virginio Piucci**, (A&P).

Dr. Piucci explained that participants will learn how higher education policymakers view the role of telecommunications in the near future, and what pioneers in college telecourse delivery have to say about their experiences. Participants also will find out what survey data tells about trends in the developing field of telecommunications and Public Broadcasting System plans for the future.

**MIDDLE EAST CONFERENCE OFFERED IN SEPTEMBER**...According to conference coordinator **Dr. Barbara Jenkins** (CE), the "Middle East Conference: Movements for Dialogue and Peace" will take place from 9 a.m.-10 p.m., Sunday and Monday, Sept. 14-15 at the Americana-Congress Hotel.

The conference will allow the Chicago Jewish, Palestinian and educational communities to address together the important issues in the Middle East conflict. Panelists will try to clarify issues, perceptions, values and needs of both sides and reveal areas of common ground and disagreement.

Dr. Jenkins said that, "We hope to build networks between the communities, especially in the form of dialogue groups which can establish grass-roots support for leaders to change and increase knowledge of conflict resolution methods."

Conference fee is \$35, and special hotel arrangements are available directly from the Americana-Congress.

**DAVID GOLDFLIES' DUOS PERFORMS SEPT. 18...**The Office of Student Life will sponsor the performance of popular jazz-rock band, David Goldflies' Duos at 5:30 p.m., Sept. 18, in the university theatre. Goldflies, founder and the driving force behind the band, has been playing bass professionally for over 15 years. His credits include international tours with the Allman Brothers Band, the Gregg Allman Band, Dickey Betts and Great Southern and Betts, Hall, Leavel and Trucks.

Explaining the effect of his music, Goldflies says, "The group presents hot jazz with a progressive edge. A free use of harmony and melody keeps Duos' compositions fresh and catching while driving rock rhythms keep the crowds moving."

MUSIC SCHOLAR PRESENTS PROGRAM ON LISZT...Dr. Lawrence Campbell of Illinois Wesleyan University will present a Liszt lecture and piano recital at 7 p.m., Thursday, Sept. 18, 1986 in the Music Recital Hall. Dr. Campbell plans to observe the 100-year anniversary of Franz Liszt by presenting lectures and piano recitals throughout the Midwest devoted to the artist's piano music.

According to Dr. Campbell, "These programs should be especially valuable to piano teachers. I hope to correct the popular misconception that Liszt wrote piano music only for the virtuoso performer. I will introduce some works of intermediate difficulty suitable for the young pianist."

Dr. Campbell holds academic degrees from Northwestern University, from which he graduated magna cum laude, and from Indiana University, where he received the doctor of music degree in performance with highest distinction.

The lecture and recital is sponsored by the Office of Student Life and the student chapter of MENC. The public is invited to the performance, and there is no charge.
