ONE-WOMAN SHOW PRESENTED FEB. 6... Walk Together Children, a collection of black poetry and prose depicted in a one-woman show by **Vinie Burrows** will be presented at 8 p.m., Feb. 6 in the GSU Theatre.

Burrows starts her program by inviting the audience to explore the past and the present of black America. Through poetry, verse and song she presents the black American's role as slave and ex-slave, as cotton picker, educated American and urban black. She includes a discussion on black participation in society by Booker T. Washington and W.E.B. DuBois.

The program incorporates works by Jenny Proctor, Sojourner Truth, Paul Laurence Dunbar, George Houston Bass, Fenton Johnson, Dudley Randall, Langston Hughes, Anita Eckford, Bob Kaufman, Gwendolyn Brooks and Haki Madhubuti.

Walk Together Children has been seen by tens of thousands of people since its New York City opening in November 1968. Burrows has since presented her one-woman show on four continents and on over 2,000 college campuses. This program is sponsored by the Office of Student Life.
