LUNCHEON NOTES SERIES CONTINUES... Luncheon Notes, a series of noontime entertainment at GSU will continue to provide free musical programs every Thursday from 12:30 to 1:15 p.m., with its March schedule to highlight "Music in our Schools" month.

March 5 the Deer Creek Junior High School Swing Choir will entertain, under the direction of **JoAnn Haley**, and on March 12 the Forest Trail Junior High School Band will entertain, under the direction of **Walter Skosz**. On March 19 the Music Educators National Conference World's Largest Concert will be presented, with area schools participating, and March 26 will feature the Reed Custer Jazz Band and Choir, under the direction of **Chris Bayer**.

GSU GRAD EXCELS AS EXPERT ON AIDS... **Wayne Nagel**, a 1983 graduate of GSU who received a master's degree in nursing, has been studying the Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) virus--its causes, the needs for medical attention, and its effect on society. A recognized expert on AIDS, he has recently begun a national seminar-lecture series on the disease geared primarily to the medical community.

Nagel focused on the AIDS virus because of his training in emergency medical care. For his practicum at GSU he spent a year planning the establishment of an aeromedical network for the University of Chicago. After his graduation in 1983, he was hired by U of C to direct the program that allows hospitals to transport their critically ill and injured to the University of Chicago by helicopter. Nagel was also one of the flight nurses for the program. Today he is an instructor at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee teaching adult critical care.

Nagel said he chose GSU for his master's degree because, "the program allowed me to develop the specialty in emergency nursing. It gave me enough latitude to develop emergency nursing interests without deviating from the soundness of the nursing program," he noted.

THEOLOGY FOR LUNCH SERIES CONTINUES... A series of lectures on religious or ethical topics, Theology for Lunch, will continue to be held on Tuesdays at noon in the Hall of Honors throughout March. This program is open to the public at no charge.

On March 3 "Fresh Currents in American Religion" will be discussed by **Rev. Larry A. McClellan**, senior pastor, St. Paul Community Church, Homewood. "The Conforming Issues in Society" will be discussed by **Dr. Kenneth Wieg** (CE) on March 10. **Tom Thomas**, doctoral candidate, University of Illinois at Chicago, will discuss "The Theological Virtues in a Contemporary Perspective" on March 17. On March 26 "Family--1987" will be discussed by **Geraldine Pellegrini**, a nurse from Joliet, and on March 31 "Personal Integrity" will be discussed by the **Rev. Joseph Stalzer** of the GSU Campus Ministries Council.

ITALIAN AMERICAN CONFERENCE CO-SPONSORED BY GSU... Studies on Italian Americans--their dialects, their writings, their social patterns, and the demographics of their migration--are being sought by the American Italian Historical Association for the group's 20th annual conference. The association is an interdisciplinary academic association founded in 1967 for the purpose of studying the Italian American experience. The conference, co-sponsored by GSU, will be in Chicago later this year.

Scholars in any discipline are invited to submit proposals by April 15 for papers and panels on any aspect of the conference theme: "Italian Ethnic: Their Language, Literature, Life."
