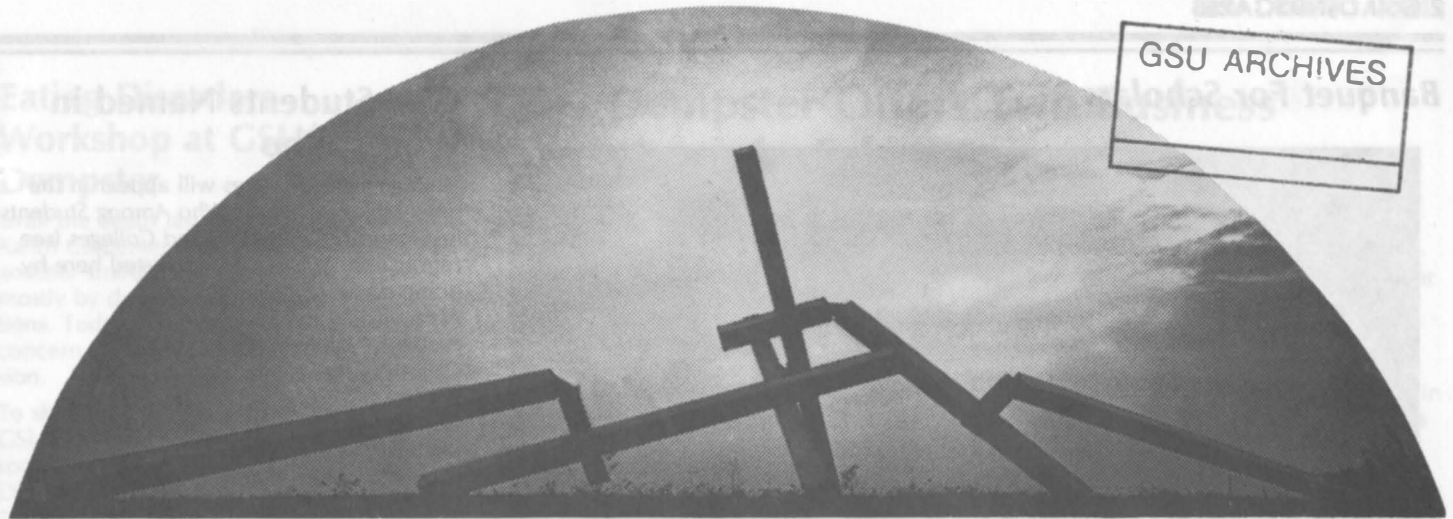

## "Princess of Black Poetry" To Appear at GSU

Nikki Giovanni, known as "The Princess of Black Poetry," will present a lecture and readings from her own works at GSU Friday, February 17, at 8 pm in University Theatre.

Giovanni, who appears as part of the university's celebration of Black History Month, is a much-honored poet, recording artist, journalist, and lecturer. She is the author of more than a dozen books, such as *Black Feeling Black Talk*, *Night Comes Softly*, *The Women and the Men*, and *Cotton Candy on a Rainy Day*.

Her recordings include *Truth Is on Its Way*, *Like a Ripple on a Pond* and *The Way I Feel*.

Giovanni is an editorial consultant to *Encore American* and *Worldwide News* magazine, as well as a columnist for that publication. Her column, "One Woman's Voice," is syndicated by the Anderson-Moberg Syndicate of the *New York Times*.

One critic described Giovanni as "the voice of a brilliant friend who's curious about everything you think of and who loves you like a sister but whom you don't see very often, and who doesn't mind telling you the whole truth in a warm way."

Born in Knoxville, Tenn., in 1943, she grew up in Cincinnati, Ohio, and attended Fisk University as a history major.

Admission for the general public at the box office is \$4 for adults and \$2 for children under 12. There is a \$1 discount for advance ticket sales and for senior citizens. Group rates are available. For more information, call the Student Activities Office at extension 2123.

## Spring Training Seminar for Township Officials Meets in Galesburg

Township officials throughout western Illinois again will have the opportunity to hone their skills and update their knowledge when the Institute of Public Policy and Administration (IPPA) of GSU convenes the Fourth Annual Spring Training Seminar for Township Officials at Carl Sandburg College in Galesburg on Saturday, Feb. 18.

The seminar is co-sponsored by the Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs (DCCA), Township Officials of Illinois (TOI) and the Community Information and Education Project (CEIS) of Spoon River and Carl Sandburg College.

This will be the first of five such seminars to be staged at strategic locations throughout the state in February and March. "Attendance has grown in each of the three previous training programs, and this year we expect to top last year's record total of more than 800 registrations," according to Paul Green, BPA, director of IPPA and a former township official. "We chose five sites to be within commuting distance of a vast majority of Illinois

Township officials. We also have expanded the scope of our agenda."

Green emphasizes that Western Illinois officials unable to attend the Feb. 18 meeting are welcome at any of the other four.

Besides Green, others involved in the planning and presentation of the seminars are: George Miller, executive director of TOI; Dave Regner, TOI legislative consultant; and George Stavroulakis, of DCCA. Several area legislators also are expected.

Dates and places for the other four seminars are: March 3 at Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville; March 10 at Sangamon State University, Springfield; March 24 at Sheraton Inn-Walden, Schaumburg; and March 31 at Clock Tower Inn, Rockford.

## Eating Disorders Workshop at GSU/Dempster

Until the death last year of popular singer Karen Carpenter, anorexia nervosa was just another strange sounding illness discussed mostly by doctors and in health publications. Today it is a matter of widespread concern to parents and the health profession.

To shed light on this subject, the GSU/Dempster Development Center is sponsoring a workshop on "Eating Disorders Among Adolescents," February 15 from 8:30 am to 12 noon at 420 W. Dempster, Mt. Prospect.

The discussion will include the full range of such disorders, such as self-starvation, bingeing, vomiting or purging to alter or maintain a desired weight.

The workshop, designed for professionals, parents and victims, will be led by Mary Jo Barrett, director of Midwest Family Resource Associations, Evergreen Park. She is an adjunct faculty member of the Institute for Juvenile Research and formerly assistant director of Parental Stress Services, Chicago.

## A.C.T. Review For High Schoolers

GSU will repeat the popular American College Test review seminar for high school juniors and seniors on February 25 and March 3, 10 and 17. Classes will meet from 9 am until 1 pm at the university.

A staff of certified and experienced teachers will lead the young people through pre-testing, post-testing, and exam taking techniques. They will concentrate on the areas of mathematics, science, English and grammar, and social studies.

The object is to help students improve their A.C.T. scores, which are of considerable importance when they apply for admission to a college or university.

Because the class has been so popular in the past, students are advised to register as early as possible. Admission will be on a first come, first served basis.

## GSU/Dempster Offers Two Business Workshops in February

Two workshops aimed at helping business people in financial and personnel matters are being offered during February at the GSU/Dempster Center.

"Recapitalization for Small and Medium Sized Companies" will be held on February 16-17 from 8:30 am until 12 noon. Topics such as conventional financial help, repositioning, capital resources, investment conduits, and converting theory into practice will be discussed. Instructor Graham Core who has had 30 years of experience as a management consultant, entrepreneur and marketing manager, will introduce actual case studies to help students solve their own problems. Core is currently president of PRW, Inc., Ltd., a Chicago-based recapitalization consulting firm.

The second workshop will be "Employee Assistance Programs: Improving Morale for Increased Productivity and Job Satisfaction," to be held on February 24

from 8 am until 12:30 pm. Instructor Barbara A. Core will help participants learn how to recognize employees in need of personal assistance and how to implement a program of interview, referral and followup that will improve performance, cut absenteeism and raise morale.

Core has been consulting with managers in the Chicago area for six years in the fields of human resource development, communication skills, leadership, and career development. She earned her Ph.D. at the University of Illinois.

Spaces in these workshops will be filled on a first come-first served basis. The cost is \$95 for the recapitalization workshop and \$50 for the employee assistance session.
