"Graduate Programs and Admissions Manual," published by the Council of Graduate Schools. A comprehensive four-volume work describing over 500 graduate institutions. The information includes information on enrollment, number of faculty, highest degree offered, tuition and fees, departmental prerequisites, and financial aid. Broken down by graduate fields. State Boards Responsible for Higher Education 1970, by J. L. Zwingle, President, Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges, and Mabel E. Rogers. Identifies the 289 State Boards and the higher education units for which they are responsible. Describes legal background, the responsibilities of the board, structure of membership, methods of selection, and relationships with other groups.

The College and the Courts: The Developing Law of the Student and the College, by M.M. Chambers. A review of almost 300 federal and state court cases affecting colleges' relations with students. Subject areas include desegregation, due process, tuition and fees, unreasonable searches and seizures, confidentiality of records, freedom of speech and assembly, and freedom of the student press. Chambers concludes that the cases indicate a "beneficial revolution" in the constitutional rights of students. Social Change, Conflict and Education, by Clifford E. Bryan, Idaho State University, and Edsel Erickson and Lewis Walker, Western Michigan University. The functions and dilemmas of education in a society characterized by rapid social change, diverse value systems and political and subcultural struggles. Published by Charles E. Efficient College Management, edited by William W. Jellema, Association of American Colleges. Authors deal with the financial aspects of collective bargaining, governance, internal and external cooperation, institutional research and other issues. 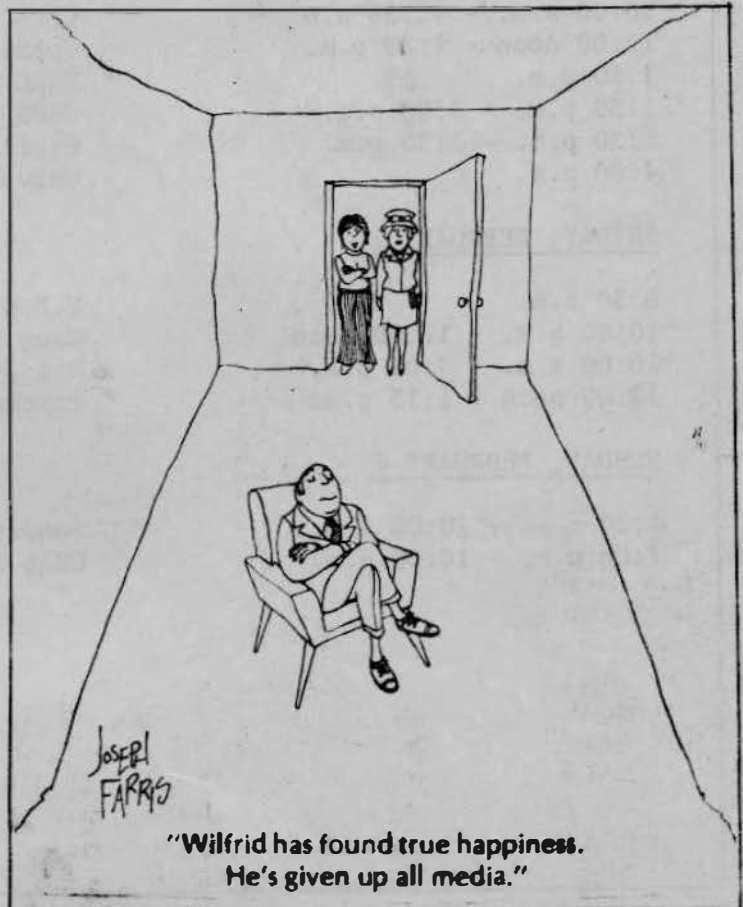
