FROM THE UNIVERSITY ASSEMBLY...The February 1 meeting of the UA marked the beginning of the second year of operation of the GSU governance system. After the approval of the minutes of the previous meeting, there were elections held by the various constituencies to determine representatives to serve on the Executive Committee. The results were:

Introduced also were PAULA WOLFF, CBPS, parliamentarian, TOM WALTER, Assembly intern, and PAMELA MADSEN, secretary to the University Assembly.

The first order of business was the discussion of overriding the presidential veto concerning the Assembly passed recommendation to preserve the Sztuba Parcel. During the discussion at least nineteen people spoke either for or against the motion to override, including interested parties who were not members of the Assembly. The final roll call vote was 20 for and 6 against, providing the necessary requirement of 2/3rds vote to override. Both sides of the question will now be presented to the BOG at its next meeting.

The unsigned Assembly-passed SCEPP recommendation concerning admissions was sent back to Committee for review, with the provision that Administrative comments would be attached. Approval was given to the Executive Committee recommendation for a resolution on Professional Personnel System, "When a GSU policy which has been approved through its governance processes appears to differ from an AAUP policy or position, the GSU policy will obtain."

WOMEN'S STUDIES LIBRARY WEEK...will be celebrated at GSU in a variety of ways. Guest speakers will address the Psychology of Women module on February 16 and there will be a community-faculty workshop on February 17. Martha Kent and Barrie Thorne, both of Michigan State University will discuss women's "put-downs" and Ms. Cecile Cliffer of Park Forest will discuss women's self-discovery. ### Student Name Grill in Honor Of Cannibal

BOULDER, COLO. (UPI): University of Colorado students have voted to rename the student union grill in honor of Alfred E. Packer, the only man ever convicted of cannibalism in U. S. history.

The student resolution said the grill, long the target of gibes for alleged poor food, "has consistently striven to attain the high standards exemplified by the life of Mr. Packer."

Packer was convicted in Lake City, Colo., in 1888 of having killed and eaten five companions caught with him in a blizzard. A Democratic judge later sentenced Packer to die for the crime. "There were only seven Democrats in Hinsdale County and you, Alfred Packer, you man-eating so-and-so, you ate five of them," the judge said.
