FY88 APPROPRIATION REDUCED 13%—SURS...According to the newsletter of the State Universities Retirement System, the governor has used his amendatory veto to reduce the FY88 appropriation for the State Universities Retirement System to \$70.7 million or approximately 47% of estimated payout. This represents a 13% reduction over last year and compares to a 4% reduction for other state agencies.

To help restore the dollars cut from the FY88 appropriation, write a short note to your representative in the Illinois House and Senate asking that they support an override of the governor's reduction veto to Senate Bill 285. Your letter should be addressed in the following manner:
