TOP SINGER-SONGWRITER, KOLOC TO PERFORM AT GSU...Bonnie Koloc will bring her emotionally charged vocal performance to center stage Friday, Oct. 16 at Governors State.

The concert, presented by the Office of Student Life, will begin at 8 p.m. in the Music Recital Hall.

Koloc earned her early following after making a reputation as a folk song interpreter and songwriter at Chicago's Earl of Old Town. She has branched into a variety of other entertainment avenues that have led to lead roles in Broadway and Chicago theatre productions.

Koloc has been able to move from folk to develop her beautiful soprano voice for a wide-range of songs which include everything from Jerome Kern to works by Duke Ellington. She is working on her eighth album and has continued to give concerts. Koloc was a guest soloist at this year's Taste of Chicago celebration and has been the guest performer at various night clubs in Chicago.

GSU CONTINUES TO BREAK ENROLLMENT RECORDS...GSU students took a record-setting 85,715 credit hours during academic year 1986-87. Records of enrollment and credit hours have been broken the last three years. Since academic year 1983-84, the university has recorded a 17.3 percent increase in credit hours. Enrollment has jumped 22.5 percent over the same period.

"These figures—while a reassurance to us that Governors State is reaching out to the community and serving greater numbers of students—puts us in a precarious position," GSU **President Leo Goodman-Malamuth** said. "GSU's budget has been reduced by **Gov. Thompson** by more than a half-million dollars for this academic year which provides a harsh irony when we are likely to serve the greatest number of students ever to pass through our doors."
