Computer Assisted Design/Demonstration is a two day workshop offered Nov. 17 and 19 from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the Computer Demonstration Room at the university. The workshop will help you gain familiarity with the latest hardware and software additions to the computer lab. Computer assisted design systems have revolutionized the fields of engineering drawing and drafting. AutoCAD is a computer aided drafting tool and can be used to do architectural drawings, interior design, facility planning, work-flow charts, organizational diagrams, graphs, line drawing, mechanical engineering drawings, and much more. PURCHASE OF MILITARY SERVICE...The Illinois State Supreme Court recently ruled that persons who were participants in the State University Retirement System (SURS) on or before Sept. 1, 1974, are eligible to purchase their military service time. The ruling applies to persons who became participants in SURS on or before that date but did not file a letter of intent preserving their right to purchase military service. SURS is awaiting information from the Office of the Attorney General of the State of Illinois to determine the cost for purchase of military time.

Individuals interested in making the military service purchase are asked to write SURS at P.O. Box 2710, Station A, Champaign, IL 61820. They should include copies of military separation papers or other documentation showing dates of active military service. LIBRARIAN INVOLVED IN NEW CHALLENGES... Barbara Smith (CCR) has been called upon to fill many assignments since she joined the GSU staff in 1974.

Barbara, who has her degrees and training as a librarian, began working in the GSU library and was promoted to head the public services division. At the time the library was organized, the Office of Special Programs and Continuing Education was also housed in the library. Barbara eventually went to work for that department for six years and headed the office twice as acting dean.

In August 1985, she joined the Provost's Office as coordinator of community college relations, representing GSU in all discussions on programs, student services and recruitment with junior colleges in the Chicago metropolitan area. In addition, she serves as staff for the Faculty Senate Academic Program Review Committee.

The Park Forest resident can recall her first days at the university "when things were pretty disorganized and bare. There were no trees, just sand piles in the Hall of Governors. There was a limited amount of carpeting, and all the walls for the classrooms weren't in place yet."

Her work is interesting, she admits, but her first love is a good library. She enjoyed many years working in public and academic libraries, including the libraries at the University of Denver, University of Chicago, and the Dayton, Cincinnati and Hong Kong Public Libraries. She also served on the library school faculty at the University of Denver and the University of Washington at Seattle.

Barbara has lived in many places in the U.S., but she's also had a foreign address in Hong Kong when her husband worked for an international company in the early 1960s. She found a librarian position for the Hong Kong Public Library which was just being organized.

"This was the first public library for Hong Kong and when I was hired on staff, I initially spent my time unpacking and cataloging books until the library opened," she said.

Living in Hong Kong was interesting, Barbara said, but not being able to cross into China was frustrating. During China's Maoist period the U.S. didn't have diplomatic relations with China so Americans weren't allowed into the country.

"We could go up to a mountain top and look over into China, but we could never cross into the country. Our other foreign friends, the Australians and others, would tell us about their visits to China," she said.
