Also heard was a protest by one of the losing bidders on a portion of the interiors for the Phase I building. It was determined that it would be in the best interests of the University and the taxpayers to accept the lowest bid as recommended by GSU thus not accepting the protest.

The Board also heard from DAN BERND (CCS) and received the Assembly-passed and presidentially-approved Professional Personnel Systems (copies are now being distributed to the staff by the Secretary to the Assembly).

Also, part of the GSU Report to the Board was a short presentation by VIRGE PIUCCI (R & I) on the GSU Macro Model.

INTO THE HAT FOR THE ARTS...GSU received a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts for an artists-and-lecturers-in-residence program. The Washington-based federal agency for the second time awarded a matching grant to BOG for the GSU program's second year. JOHN PAYNE (CCS) said the program will underline art, its purposes and meaning, with artists and lecturers in visual and studio oarts discussing trends in art, ethnics, and culture. Some lectures will relate to the issues of art and technology. About five full learning modules should result and one or two mini-modules, artists lecturing one or two days.




