Bulletin Board Mania Invades UL...Do library workers sit with their noses in books all day whispering?

"No," says **Jill Stanley**, University Library office supervisor.
"These people have some of the wildest senses of humor I've ever encountered."

And now Stanley has added her own sense of humor to the quiet spaces of the second floor with her bulletin board handiwork.

"The bulletin board really belongs to the documents section, but I couldn't stand walking past it from January to April when it was full of tax information. I mean, who likes taxes?" she wonders. "So I

asked if I could do something with the space."

When Stanley learned the date of the carpeting/remodeling work in the periodicals section of the library this summer, she immediately went to work.

"When they told me June 6, I knew it would be a D-Day theme. My father was a history buff. He served in World War II, so I know all the important dates from the war" she said. What she came up with was "the invasion of the carpet crews." Her bulletin board was filled with memos on the reconnaissance experts spotting troops of electricians, carpenters, movers and carpet layers invading the second floor.

"Low-flying reconnaissance planes were spotted circling over the stacks in the University Library today. Troopers were reportedly filling the planes with non-toxic glue and thoroughly saturating the area. It is not known if this act is in conjunction with the carpet-laying process, or simply a 1940s spirit week revival" one of the board's memos explained.

Photos on the bulletin board included a line of jeeps with the caption, "The carpet crew arrives," and a photo of a military man who stopped a Mideast resident in his jeep was captioned "Library director confers with carpet party rebel."

Stanley says she knows of one written response to her work, presumably from a member of the reconnaissance team. The message: "It's no rumor! Your days have been numbered and found wanting. Surrender! We have already undermined your library. Your resistance is futile. You have kept them in the dark long enough. We have come to enlighten your masses of stacks."

Once the hair-raising experience of war was behind them, Stanley decided people needed a vacation. She planned the current bulletin board "See the USA in Your Chevrolet"...a link back to the 1950s "Dinah Shore Show."

Using 1950s editions of the National Geographic, Stanley came up with depictions to entice us onto America's highways, with such notable ads as "Welcome to America's Wonderful Waterways—Trailer Your Boat to Fun Afloat," or "Free Dream-Aids & Trailways Does All the Planning" and "Some People Have All the Fun—Michigan Style."

Accompanying photos will have you reminisce about June and Ward Cleaver. (Sorry guys, back then there weren't any bikini-clad surfers photographed on California's beaches.) On a table display under the bulletin board the library staff had current brochures to help with travel arrangements.

Stanley says the bulletin board is a "one-woman effort" with creative assistance from library assistant **Pat Walker** and materials assistance from the reference staff who help her find "pertinent" materials. "No matter what I think up, I can find it here in our library," she explained.

"The idea behind these projects is just to create some levity," she said.

Stanley's already planning her next work using presidential commissions for a theme—in keeping with GSU's status as a federal documents depository.

And in December when the rest of the library undergoes renovation? Well, it's back to war, of course. Pearl Harbor Day was Dec. 7.

Subject: FISCAL YEAR FY1989 OPERATING BUDGET

On July 14, 1988, the Governor signed the Board of Governors FY1989 Appropriation Bill into law. This appropriation provides Governors State University with a 4.7 percent increase over the FY1988 appropriated budget. The FY1989 budget, which totals \$20,655,300, is approximately \$800,000 higher than the budget originally recommended by the Governor in March 1988. The addition provides some funding for anticipated salary increases, but does not include support for price increases or program expansion.

For the second year in a row adequate funding for higher education has not been provided. When I spoke with campus and community constituencies during the fall and spring, the outlook for a tax increase seemed optimistic, but it failed again. Higher education, and Governors State University, must continue to struggle with basically the same program support as in FY1988.

In order to accommodate this funding level and a potential income fund shortfall, several vacant positions will not be filled for FY1989, and reductions have been applied to balance nonpersonal line-items. Commodities and contractual services have been reduced by five percent at the cost center level. Collegial travel budgets have been adjusted to meet instructional travel needs and to maintain faculty professional travel. The GSU Alumni Association again will provide additional funds totaling \$19,000 to support faculty travel in FY1989. Equipment funds have been maintained at the same level as FY1988. The library materials allocation has been increased by \$50,000 to offset last year's reduction and inflationary increases.

The University reserves have been established at a higher-than-normal level for FY1989 due to concerns about declining enrollment and a resultant income fund shortfall as well as overbudgeting of personal services due to inadequate funding of salary increases. Approximately two percent of the total budget resides in the reserves or on-hold in other accounts. This amount will allow the University to adjust to a three percent decline in enrollment without requesting a turnback of funds from Units. Thus, the outlook for the year is more than ever

before dependent upon enrollment levels. If fall trimester enrollment increases or is stable, it is probable that a mid-year review will result in release of the reserves.

The vice presidents and I have thoroughly reviewed recommendations for initial allocations of the FY1989 State-appropriated budget. I believe that the unit allocations support the University's priorities and the need to increase enrollment. These circumstances continue to test the determination and skill of all parts of the University to maintain quality programs and services. The University currently enjoys a high level of recognition, support, and respect in the region and we must strive to retain our long-term viability and stability in the region.

I want to thank those who contributed to the budget-planning process for FY1989. Despite the fact that many requests cannot be funded, working together through the ambiguous budget situation has enabled the University to reallocate funds to priorities. The budget process is never easy and may seem unrewarding in recent years, but my commitment to seeking the funds required by our institution will not waiver.
