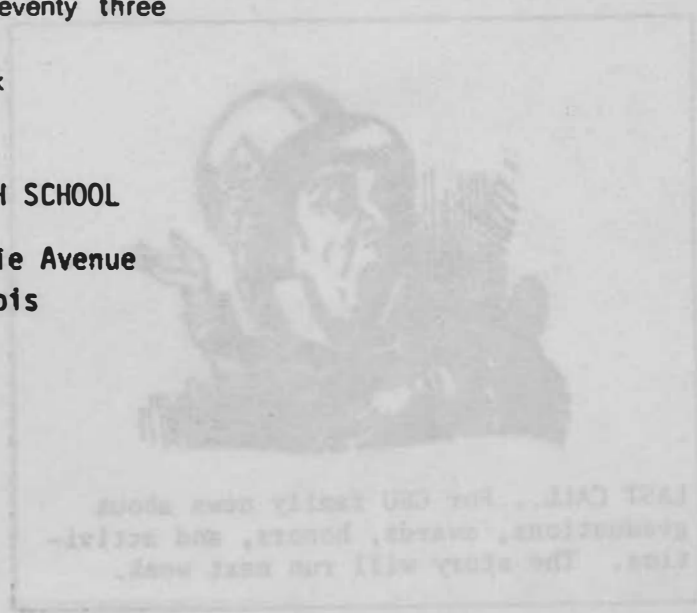

LATEST SCOOP ON GRADUATION...DR. JEROME SACHS, president of Northeastern Illinois University, will give the principal address at GSU's second commencement exercise Sunday, June 24, at 3 p.m. The increasingly large number of degree candidates and the expected crowd of guests made it necessary to move the location for ceremonies from the mini-campus to Homewood-Flossmoor High School at Flossmoor Rd. and Kedzie Ave., Flossmoor. There will be nearly 300 degree candidates who'll walk away with sheepskins as GSU graduates. MARY ENDRES, university vice-president of academic affairs, will present the candidates, with DEAN RUBEN V. AUSTIN (CBPS), DEAN ALFONSO SHERMAN (CCS), DEAN TED ANDREWS (CEAS), and DEAN WILLIAM KATZ (CHLD). Degrees will be conferred by PRES. WILLIAM ENGBRETSON, and he'll also recognize distinguished teachers. Other speakers will be BOG Chairperson HOWARD V. PHALIN of Winnetka, and University Assembly Chairman, DANIEL BERND. The REV. DR. LARRY McCLELLAN (CCS) will give the invocation. BRENDA JONES of Harvey will be vocal soloist. NANCY OKRONGLEY, Homewood, will be pianist for the processional and recessional. WALTER HENDERSON, Chicago Heights, will provide a prelude of electronic music. BRENDA, NANCY, and WALTER are all GSU students.

AMEN...AMAIN...Jewish history and thought through literature will be offered at GSU next Session by Rabbi FRANK P. ROSENTHAL of Temple Anshe Sholom, CCS Community Professor. The learning module on Tuesday and Thursday, 9 a.m. to noon, at Temple Anshe Sholom in Olympia Fields is for two to four units. Covering the Roman period, it will take into account Christian beginnings, salvationist movements, evolution of the synagogue, the prayerbook, Talmud, and Midrash. It will emphasize the Spanish period of early Moor settlements in Andalusia and the resulting golden age in Spain, usually known as the medieval period. Included will be the Jew in the Moslem world, the Jew in the Holy Roman Empire, and Jewish philosophy and mysticism. Students are expected to become conversant with books selected from a bibliography and to concern themselves in writing with at least one particular subject of the area (a term paper) to qualify for the appropriate credits.

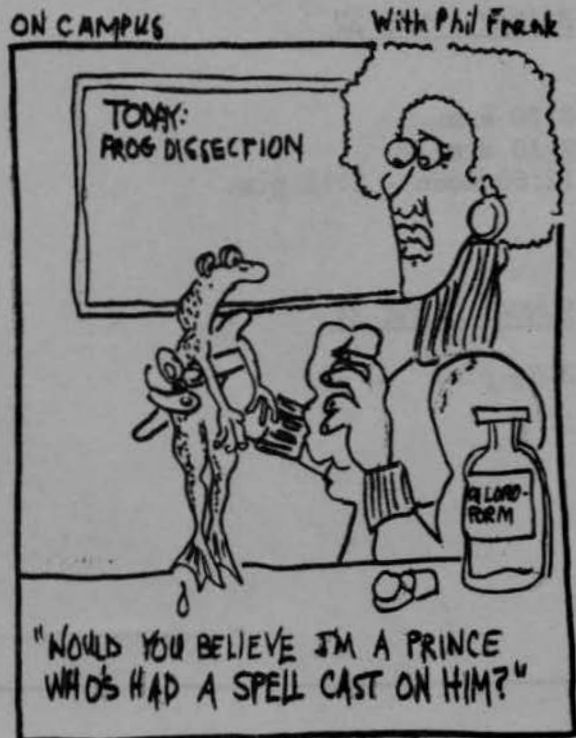

SLANT ON A GRANT...BOB KREBS (R & I) has information about Fulbright-Hays grants. For starters, he's announcing that Institute of International Education grant application forms are available for graduate study abroad in 1974-75. IIE administers grants for study, research, and professional training abroad under the Fulbright-Hays Program. They are "reserved for advanced graduate students who, in most cases, will be engaged in research for the doctoral dissertation." There are also other awards for "graduate students, graduating seniors, and candidates who wish to further their careers in the creative and performing arts." Fulbright-Hays Full Grants provide transportation, tuition, books, and maintenance for one academic year in one country. Language or orientation course may be available as required. Travel Grants are available for round-trip transportation to selected countries only. Foreign Grants may, in some cases, be supplemented by Fulbright-Hays Travel Grants. They may not be held concurrently with Full Grants. Special Programs of direct exchange between American and foreign universities may, on occasion, receive Travel Grants. Eligibility requirements include U.S. citizenship; B.A. degree (or equivalent), but not a doctoral degree; practical language proficiency; good health; and, for the most part, a U.S. education. Final applications from students-at-large must be submitted by November 1, 1973. Requests for applications will not be honored after October 15. See BOB KREBS for additional information.
