The instructor, Professor Gardiner, whittled the LSAT questions down to their simplest forms and made them seem easy and straightforward. As a result, by the time I took the real LSAT, I felt confident and prepared."

This GSU alumna and Crete-native got into not one — but TWELVE— and ended up with her top choice, Notre Dame Law School.

Trevor Hoskins started as a line worker at a Ford Motor Company plant in Illinois. When sharing with a co-worker his desire to go to college, Governors State University (Governors State) was recommended for its affordability and quality. After comparing Governors State's curriculum with the requirements for the job he wanted (Ford Production Supervisor), he enrolled in the Interdisciplinary Studies program (IDSS) in May 2016. With his associate degree and prior learning assessment credits, Hoskins was able to earn his bachelor's degree in only two semesters.

It was not an easy road, but a great mentor helped. Hoskins met College of Business Professor Tricia Kerns, and she encouraged him to enroll at the School of

Extended Learning (SXL) in a Lean Six Sigma Green Belt (LSSGB) certification program to help his work at Ford. And it did help. With his new knowledge, Hoskins was able to produce record production numbers and show substantial improvement in his department during the biggest launch in the history of Ford Motor Company.

"Lean Six Sigma forces you to touch the problem. Then you look at the processes and how they affect people," Hoskins shared.

Hoskins began his Lean Six Sigma Black Belt certification training and hopes to someday be a Plant Manager at Ford Motor Company, and a partner in an investment group.

Humbled by his own success, Hoskins credits his parents, especially his mother, Trennese Jones, and God.

"Everything I have is because of God's grace, coming from a great father, and a faithful mother. Everything GREAT I have achieved is because of my mom."
