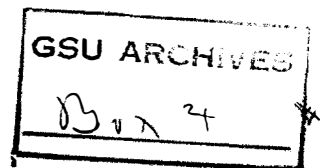

IN MEMORIAM

Robert A. Kloss
January 15, 1924 -
January 15, 1975

BOB KLOSS was at Ingalls Memorial Hospital for exploratory surgery when he met his untimely and sudden death. He was an early pioneer of GSU joining EAS in September, 1970 from the Center for Educational Affairs at Argonne National Laboratory. Formerly, he was on the faculty at the University of Wyoming and Northern Illinois Univ. He published frequently in his field of biochemistry and was the recipient of numerous research grants. In 1968, he was on the program planning committee for Sangamon State, Illinois' other upper division university. Most recently, Bob had the assignment as Assistant Dean for Fiscal and Physical Affairs in EAS. At the time of his death, he was greatly involved in getting the EAS physical facilities completed and in operation as designed by Bob and his colleagues in EAS and GSU in those early years.

Bob's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Kloss of 1111 South 56 Street, West Allis, Wisconsin, 53214 are now at Bob's residence at 166 Hemlock in Park Forest. At this time, no decision has been reached about a funeral or memorial service.

JANUARY BOG MEETING...at GSU resulted in creation of a committee to discuss, study, and research whether or not collective bargaining is in the best interests of the five Universities in the BOG system. If collective bargaining is in the best interest of the Universities, the committee is charged to recommend legislation to permit the BOG to enter into collective bargaining. (The Council of Presidents has gone on record as opposing collective bargaining without enabling legislation, while a faculty referendum at the BOG schools this fall overwhelmingly favored collective bargaining)...Dr. James Brown was appointed a finance officer, central office of the Board...Executive Officer Jerome Sachs reported that the 1975-76 Board of Higher Education Budget recommendation is approximately \$500,000 to bring BOG faculty salaries up toward institutional medians at other higher education systems.

THEATRE TRYOUTS...Tryouts for GSU's next major theatre production--Noel Coward's "Blithe Spirit" will be on Jan. 27, 28, and 29 and Feb. 4, 6, and 7 from 2-6 p.m. at the GSU Theater, according to play director AL SHERMAN. NEW GSU INFORMATION CENTER...will finally be launched beginning in February. Susan Woodham will join the Office of Communications to assume the position of Information Services Supervisor and will coordinate services to be provided by an Information Center to be located inside the main entrance area of the University.

ARGONNE DIRECTOR AT GSU...Dr. Robert G. Sachs, Director of the Argonne National Laboratories will speak on Feb. 7 at 8 p.m. in the Community Conference Cntr. "Energy Options" will be his subject as the EAS Science Community Council "First Friday Series" continues. Dr. Sachs is also professor of physics, Enrico Fermi Institute, at the University of Chicago.

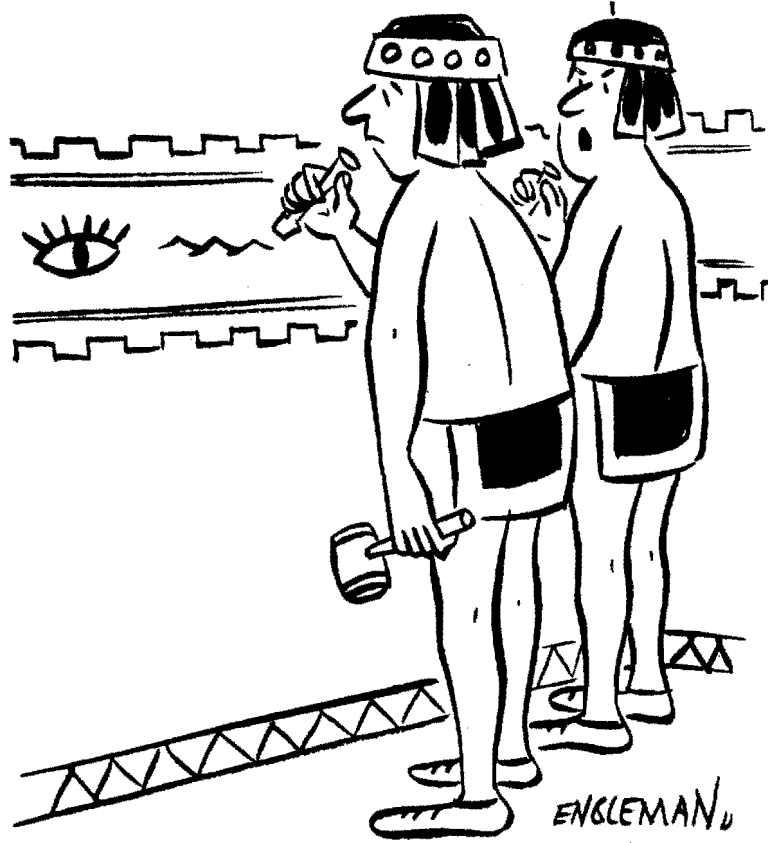

VISITING SCHOLAR...from Europe will appear at at GSU Jan. 28 at 7 p.m. on "Your Personal Life History Traceable in Your Handwriting" and Jan 29 at 7 p.m. on Psychoanalysis and "Graphology at Work in the Clinical Case 'Feelings of Hostility.'" Dr. Christian Dettweiler of Stuttgart, West Germany is the speaker and an internationally known expert for his publications on the pressure effects of industrial society upon man, woman and child. There will be a discussion of a panel of experts from GSU and the Chicago community at each session. The sessions are sponsored by SSAC and HLD.

EDUCATORS TO AFRICA ASSOCIATION...of the African-American Institute works to further African development and increase American understanding of the economies, cultures, and politics of Africa and of such issues as human rights and racial equality including Southern Africa. Since 1969, the Institute has taken over 800 "Educators to Africa" in an accredited program in conjunction with Howard University.
