Important deadline...Nominating petitions for University Assembly elections must be returned by Monday, February 3, 8:30 a.m. Completed petitions may be turned in to either the Office of Communications or Student Services.

ADMINISTRATIVE WING RESHUFFLES...As approved by the President-Vice Presidents' meeting Jan. 21, BILL BRAZLEY (BPS) manager of Space and Facilities will become Director of Physical Studies and Assistant Director of Budget and Planning, serving the office of V.P. Adm. in a dual capacity. His duties will include coordinating preparation of space needs and plans, performing special studies related to space and facilities, and furnishing general assistance to the Vice President. His former position will be deleted with space scheduling and property control continued by BPS personnel. Also approved Jan. 21, the Budget office will be known as the Office of Budget and Planning in recognition of the twin functions assigned to that office. RICH LAZARSKI's title of Budget Officer will be changed to Director of Budget and Planning with BILL BRAZLEY as his assistant.

TRUDY LOEBER, LRC Media Librarian, died suddenly last Sunday from an apparent lung disorder. She had been on the LRC staff since March, 1973. In addition to her work in providing media support for the GSU community through the LRC, and Liaison to ICC, she was an active participant on state and national committees relating to library and media services. She was a member of the American Library Association, Association of Educational Communication and Technology, and the Library Association. Previously, she held positions in the library at the Univ. of Nebraska and had been Audio-Visual head of the Alexandria, Virginia Library.

In Park Forest South, she was VP and Secretary of the Vistas Townhomes Association.

After visitation Tuesday, January 28, at the Lain and Sons Funeral Home in Park Forest, funeral services and burial were held Friday, January 31 in Richmond Hill, New York.

Trudy is survived by her husband, Wilfried of Park Forest South, her mother, Mrs. Kornelia D. Palmi, of Richmond Hill, New York, a sister and a brother.

SUNDAY TRAFFIC IN LRC...According to a study by DICK VORWERK (LRC), the average number of people making use of the LRC on Sundays since Sept. 8, 1974 is 29. As a result, the LRC will be closed on Sundays, beginning the first week of February and the closing will be subject to periodic review. This is an energy conservation action which also saves the equivalent of 3 to 4 personnel service days weekly. This action was approved at the President-Vice Presidents' meeting on Jan. 14.

PROCEDURE CHANGES FROM A & R...

1. Students may add units to learning modules in which they are already enrolled during the add-drop period of the following session: e.g., if a student is enrolled in 5000w for 2 units, the student may add 1 unit during the MA add-drop period.
2. Only students who have completed degree requirements will be listed in commencement programs and will participate in commencement ceremony.
3. Due to budgetary restraints, the Office of Admissions and Records will be issuing 11"x14" diplomas on simulated sheepskin rather than genuine sheepskin as was approved a year and a half ago by the Academic Wing. No covers will be used. Diplomas will be ordered only 3 times a year: May, August, and January and only for students who have graduated.

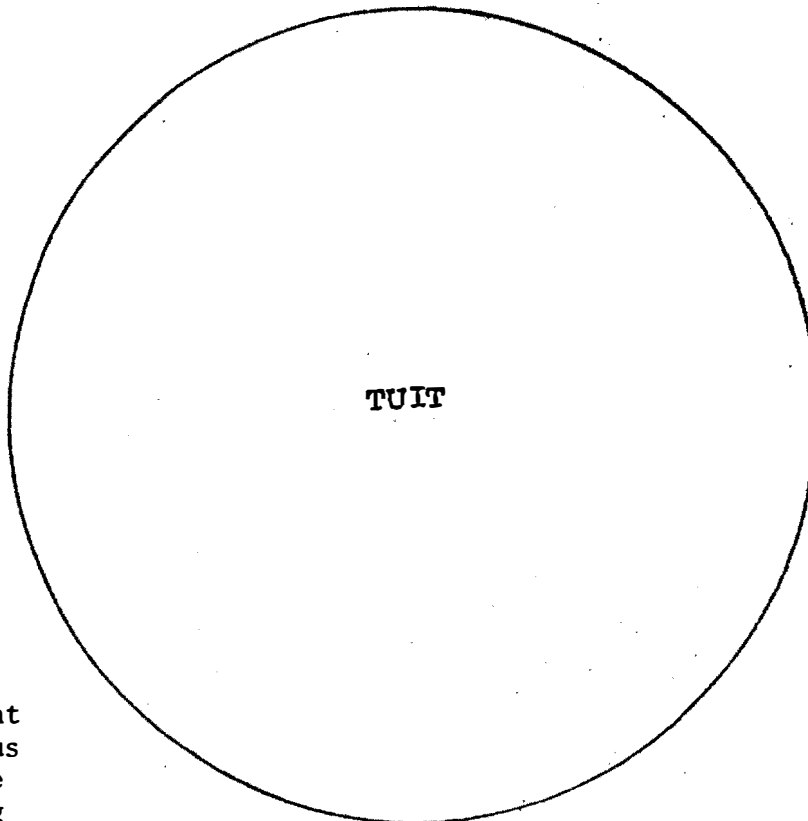
