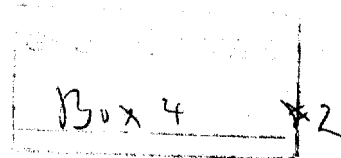

**UNIVERSITY ASSEMBLY - OFFICER ELECTIONS...**  
Elections for the positions of Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary of the University Assembly are scheduled for Feb. 12-15. Voting will be on a university-wide basis. Faculty members of the assembly are eligible to run for Chairman and Vice Chairman.

All non-faculty members on the assembly are eligible for the position of secretary. PAM MADSEN, University Assembly secretary, will be in contact with all members to inquire about their interest in running.

**APPOINTED...**JAMES GALLAGHER (EAS) and DANIEL BERND (CS) have been appointed co-directors from GSU to participate in a three year program to study changes in liberal education. Invitations were issued to 17 institutions out of 183 applications to the Change in Liberal Education, Washington, D.C. The project will concentrate on defining the competencies of the liberally educated person, developing assessment instruments, implementing and evaluating their effectiveness. GSU proposes to develop a competency-based program of liberal education that will emphasize humanistic learning while developing skills needed by an upwardly mobile student body. In developing the new program, GSU will build on considerable experience in innovative education, especially competency-based instruction and interdisciplinary teaching.

GRADUATE TEST FEE...of \$15 will be charged by GSU beginning M-A '75 session for grad students of EAS, BPS, and HLD. The fee will cover the cost of examination materials and administering. Graduate test results will be used for preparing student study plans and not for admission to programs. The fee will be assessed during the second session in which the student registers as a degree-seeking graduate student at GSU. For students taking required tests outside of the university, costs will be authorized by the respective dean and paid for from the graduate test fee account.

THE WORD IS "SLIPPERY"...PAUL HILL, University Advocate, would like to call attention to all GSUers that the Stuenkel Road exit can become extremely hazardous under certain conditions. A LEGISLATIVE INTERN PROGRAM...will be offered by GSU to students in all four colleges in a joint effort with Chicago State University and others. Two to four students will be appointed on the basis of recommendations to be completed by Feb. 12. Students will enroll in a M-A module providing background orientation for Illinois state political systems, then obtain practical experience while working as aides to legislators in the Illinois General Assembly and doing research the following session (M-J). A \$1,000 stipend will be given to each student for the move to Springfield.

SUMMARY OF ILLINOIS LAW AS TO THE MEETINGS OF PUBLIC AGENCIES, WITH RESPECT TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS

All meetings of the Board of Governors and its subsidiary bodies, including committees and subcommittees, must be public meetings except for:

(1) collective negotiating matters between the Board and its employees or representatives;

(2) meetings where the acquisition of real property is being considered;

(3) meetings where a pending court proceeding against or on behalf of the Board is being considered;

(4) meetings relating to campus security or to the safety of staff and students;

(5) meetings to consider information regarding appointment, employment or dismissal of an employee or officer, or to hear testimony on a complaint lodged against an employee or officer to determine its validity, but no final action as to such matters may be taken at a closed session;

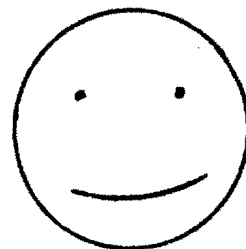
(6) meetings which are closed when required by Federal regulation; and

(7) meetings of an advisory committee appointed to provide the Board with professional consultation on matters germane to its field of competence to consider matters of professional ethics or performance.

Any person violating the Act shall be guilty of a "Class C Misdemeanor", punishable by imprisonment for 30 days or less.
