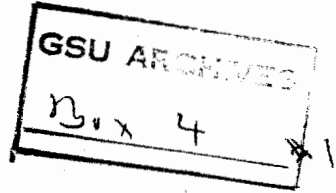

NORTH CENTRAL LAUDS GSU...In a report on the December visit of the North Central visiting team, the following recommendation has been made:

"The visiting team unanimously recommends that accreditation at the bachelor's and master's level be granted to Governors State University and that the institution be revisited after a five-year interval.

This recommendation is based upon the unquestioned quality of the faculty, an excellent fiscal base, well-articulated goals capable students, a flexible plant with impressive supporting instructional resources, excellent evaluative mechanisms, competent administrative leadership, a strong support from the Board of Governors, and a well-designed, innovative performance based instructional program tailored to the needs of the institutions clientele."

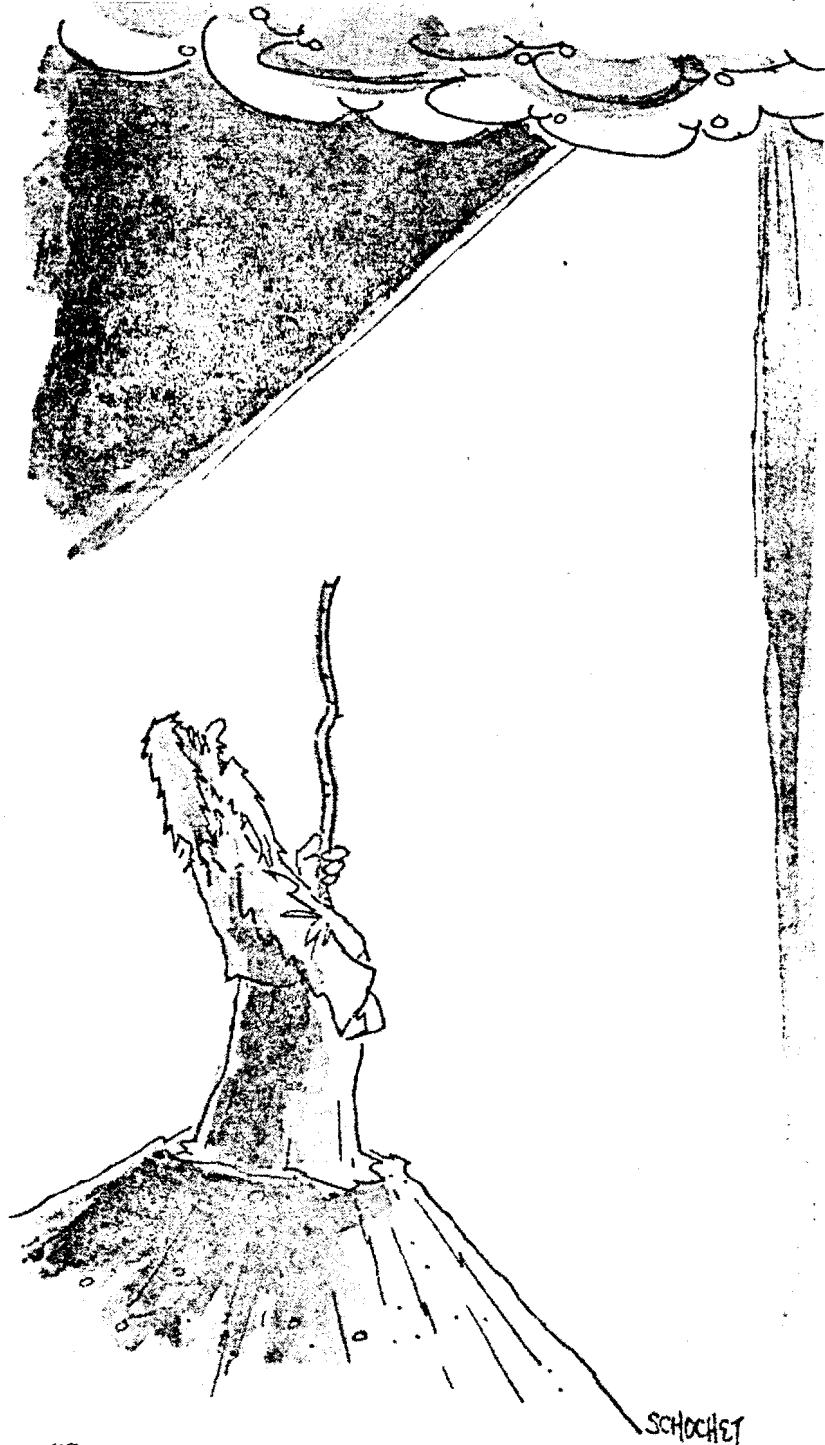

GRANTED...The Chicago Metropolitan Higher Education Council has received a \$24,500 grant from the IBHE's Higher Education Cooperative Act for a proposal entitled "Cooperative System to Implement Programs of Mediated Alternative and External Education". The proposal is aimed at potential students of higher education in the Chicago area now unserved by conventional means. The grant, approved at the BHE meeting Jan. 7, is for a one-year period, beginning Jan. 1, 1975. Additional funds have been received from institutional assessments and are being sought from foundations. DAVID AINSWORTH (ICC) and TED ANDREWS (EAS) are GSU reps to the council.
