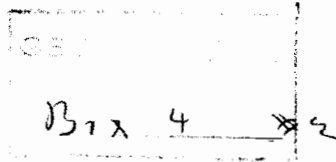

**VOTE! JUNE 19-25**

**BOG STUDENT REP...** State legislation provides that each institution under the Board of Governors shall select one non-voting student member of the BOG, to serve a one-year term. The current term of office is soon to expire, with a new representative to be seated at the July Board meeting.

Petitions for this position are now available to any interested currently enrolled GSU students from either Pam Madsen, Office of Academic Affairs, the Student Assistant Deans of each College, or from the first floor Information Office.

Petitions require 100 signatures (with legibly printed names following) of currently enrolled GSU students, and are to be returned to Pam Madsen or the Information Office no later than 5:00 p.m., Friday, June 13. Names will appear on ballots in order of time of filing of completed petitions.

The election will be held June 19, 20, 21, 23, 24, and 25, with balloting taking place in the Information Office. The polls will be open from 10:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. on weekdays, and from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon on Saturday.

**NEW UNIVERSITY CONSTITUTION...** Balloting on the new University Constitution will take place June 19-25 to coordinate with elections for the BOG student representative. The proposed system of governance must receive the approval of a majority of those voting in student, faculty, civil service, and support constituencies for ratification.

Vote for both...same time, same place.

**GRADUATION: PARTS I AND II...** GSU will hold summer commencement ceremonies in two parts Sunday, July 20.

Commencement in the university gymnasium at 1:30 p.m. will be for graduates of BPS, CCS, and EAS. At 4:30 p.m., graduates of HLD and the BOG degree program will graduate.

Seating capacity in the gym is 2,300. There will be a total of about 700 bachelors and masters graduates plus families and friends to be accommodated. Two honorary doctorates will be conferred. This fifth commencement will bring to about 1,750 the number of students who have graduated since GSU opened.

"WORKING IN THE PRIVATE SECTOR"...a module that will investigate the development of civil service and public employment in Illinois on the state, county, university, and municipal levels will be offered for the J/A session. The course will cover recruitment, examinations, affirmative action, selection, grievance procedures. PAULA WOLFF (BPS), PETER COLBY (BPS), and Bea Rieckhoff, Cook County civil service commissioner, will team teach. Outside speakers will include Joan Cole, deputy director of the Chicago Civil Service Commission; T. Burkhardt, village manager of Homewood; Walter Ingerski of University Civil Service; Lawrence Dolan of the Department of Public Aid; Steve Klem of the Cook County Department of Personnel; Max Liberless, president of the Public Aid Employees union, and Robert O'Keefe, former executive secretary of the Illinois Civil Service Commission and now on the legislative staff of the president of the Illinois senate. There will be no books to purchase for the module. Registration for the J/A session is June 17-19, 1:30 - 8:00 p.m.

DID YOU KNOW?...According to a recent survey conducted by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, the increase in dollar support for state colleges and universities will average around 5 percent nationally; compared with a prediction that the inflation rate for 1975 will not be much better than the 12.4 percent experienced in 1974. State colleges and universities in 14 states will receive considerably less than the predicted 5 percent national average: in Florida, Maryland, North Carolina, Tennessee, South Dakota, Wisconsin, Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Rhode Island and Vermont, appropriations range from 16 percent decreases to 3 percent increases when compared with 1974-75 appropriations.

CALLING ALL GHOST RIDERS...A GSU Bike Rodeo, free for children of all ages, will be held at GSU June 14. Its theme is "Be a ghost rider. Ride as if you are invisible! Never assume the other person has seen you!"

Presented as a community service by the university department of public safety in cooperation with the Student Services Advisory Committee, the bicycle safety check will be at 10 am in parking lot "D" on the southwest side of the campus.
