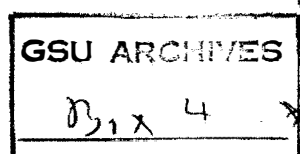

**CENTRAL DUPLICATING MOVES...**Central Duplicating will be relocating its office and production facilities to the Planning Building within the next few weeks. The tentative (3-day) move is scheduled for Aug. 11-13.

All Duplicating and Printing Services will be cut back on Monday, Aug. 11, suspended entirely Tuesday, Aug. 12, and partial service resumed Wednesday, Aug. 13. Full production facilities will be operational on Thursday, Aug. 14.

We urge all Units to plan their printing and duplicating requirements with this schedule in mind. To facilitate handling of reproduction requests, Central Duplicating will be providing all Units with special, one-way envelopes (yellow with red printing). Simply complete your Job Request form in the usual manner, attach originals and enclose in envelope, then place at your Unit's mail pick-up location. The envelopes will be delivered directly to Central Duplicating for immediate processing. Delivery of completed work will be accomplished by the B&PO distribution system which currently delivers Central Stores orders.

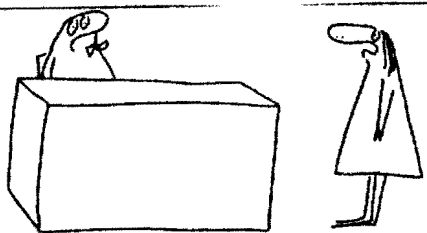
NEW PERFORMANCE DATES...for the summer repertory theater program at GSU have been announced:

GRANTED...Nursing education grants totaling \$137,019 have been awarded to seven colleges, including GSU, in the 17th Congressional District. GSU was awarded \$24,517.

The grants were approved by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare under the Nurse Training Act of 1971. The payments were made to schools participating in the Nursing Capitation Program for fiscal 1975.

Other area colleges receiving grants are: Joliet Junior College \$24,904; Kankakee Community College \$13,974; Lewis University, Lockport \$19,973; Olivet Nazarene College, Kankakee \$24,449; and Prairie State College, Chicago Heights \$30,402.

GSU PROFILE...Latest headcounts reveal these interesting facts about the GSU population: 57 communities are represented among 470 faculty and employees of the University: Park Forest 95, Park Forest South 79, Chicago 47, Chicago Heights 38, Richton Park 36, Crete 15, Homewood 14, Monee 12, Flossmoor 10, and Peotone 10. The GSU student population hails from distant spots such as District of Columbia, New York, Wisconsin, and Washington, plus closer locations in Indiana and Illinois. 176 towns are listed together. Chicago students number 1,374, Park Forest 417, Chicago Heights 134, Joliet 99, Park Forest South 99, and Harvey 90.

844 degrees were conferred at the last commencement July 20. BPS awarded 61 B.A.'s and 62 M.A.'s; CCS B.A.'s 31, M.A.'s 95; EAS B.A.'s 21, M.A.'s 41; HLD B.A.'s 112 and M.A.'s 371. There were 50 BOG graduates.

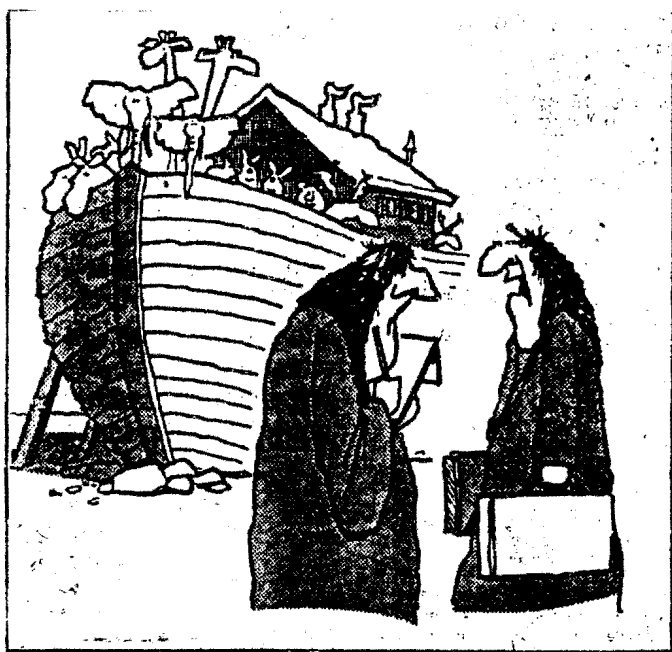

**OBSERVATIONS ON LISTENING TECHNIQUES**

1. A non-listener is characterized by absence of physical movement and an eye link rate of less than once every three to five seconds.
2. Individuals who are listening in an adult mode (Adult in the TA sense of the word which means rational nonemotional dealing with reality) have a physically squared-up, level head posture over 90% the time vs. tilting, angled to either left, forward or backwards posture.
3. Listening should be differentiated from hearing. Hearing is a semi-automatic auditory environment scanning operation

which can be repeated back to others in a mechanical fashion with essentially no personal involvement by the individuals.

4. Repetitious, non-audible activities such as silent head nodding in response to speech by another will be experienced as deprivation by the talker.
5. Several useful techniques for helping individuals modify their present listening responses are: A. Offer a one or two-syllable response at least once every 20 seconds. This helps break up the getting all wound up with talker monologues and the feeling of being left out by the listener and resolves the "I can't think of anything to say" type of problem. B. For those who complain

about "I can't talk with others," "no one talks to me,"

"I lose track of what people are saying," the prescription is get a move on, i.e., blink, shift around, let oneself be "moved" by the speaker. C. For those who want to feel more in touch to what is going on and in control of themselves, gently rubbing ones teeth back and forth over each other has an interesting psychological effect when practiced for 20 or 30 seconds at a time several times a day or in moments of stress for a few seconds at a time. D. If, as the listener, your emotions are overriding problem solving, the "Get Level With" described above will be useful to get to your Adult (TA wise).
