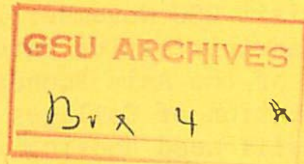

DID YOU KNOW...that a record 4,221 students are currently enrolled at GSU for the fall trimester?...that the U.S. Army listens when Michael Lewis (HLD) and HLD grad student Phyllis Warren speak? The Armed Forces are now following recommendations made in their study of alleged recruitment abuses published in the Personnel and Guidance Journal for Jan. '75. Dr. Lewis and Ms. Warren charged that many youths enlist for specific military duty trusting in the word of the recruiter or recruitment contract, only to discover that neither is binding on the military. Recommendations were: take pressure off recruiters for quotas, avoid the word contract, and use the word agreement...that Jim Sinopoli, first EAS environmental management graduate from EAS and former community professor (1974/5) is now with the Wisconsin State Dept. of Planning? Jim successfully competed with several Ph.D.'s for the position...That there are only 87 shopping days until Christmas.

WOMEN'S RESOURCE CENTER NEWS...The first monthly meeting of "Women's Brown Bag Lunch" is scheduled for Wed., Oct. 1 in the Human Resource Center (B1507) at 11:30 a.m. All are invited to bring lunches and exchange views at this informal gathering set for the first Wed. of each month. AUDUBON WILDLIFE FILMS..."The Marsh--a Quiet Mystery" will be presented Fri., Oct. 3, at 8 p.m. in the Ludeman Center auditorium, 114 North Orchard Drive, Park Forest. SUCCESS STORY: BOG/BA...More than 400 college graduates in Illinois now hold a Board of Governors BA degree. A program for working adults operating at five state universities, the BOG/BA began in January of 1973. Over 200 adults enrolled within the first six months, 500 by year's end. There are at present 2800 BOG students in Illinois. Discussing the unique features of the program, Dr. Pringle, Chairman of the BOG/BA Steering Committee stated: "the overriding concern that went into the motivation and design...was to make a college education available to working adults on their terms." A no-hassle admissions policy and the granting of college credit for previous learning and skills after faculty review fulfills this concern. GSU has graduated 110 from the BOG program since its inception.

Series starts Sept. 27

College course in The Tribune

STARTING Sept. 27, readers of The Tribune will have an opportunity to take a college course for credit thru a series of 18 articles appearing on the Saturday Perspective page.

The series, called American Issues Forum, was written with the nation's bicentennial as a focal point. The articles will discuss America's past, present, and future, delving into such



contemporary issues as human rights, land use, and the workings of government.

The series will examine the peopling of the North American continent, the changing national landscape, the emergence of a political ideology and the formation of a democracy.

Six scholar-authors wrote the articles especially for this course, which was designed at the University of California at San Diego. Daniel Aaron, Victor Thomas Professor of English and American Language and Literature at Harvard University, coordinated the course.

Readers wishing to take the course for academic credit may do so in conjunction with City Colleges of Chicago or Governors State University.

AT CITY Colleges of Chicago, which will give three semester hours of credit in social science, the enrollment fee is \$9 for city residents and \$109.05 for noncity residents. Those enrolling must have a high school diploma or its equivalent. The course will include midterm and final ex-

ams and group discussions. A Reader and Study Guide will be required. [Allow about four days for delivery.] For more information, call the college at 269-8180.

At Governors State University in Park Forest South, readers may enroll for either one, two, or three hours credit. Cost is \$14.25 for each credit hour. To enroll, a student must have 60 credit hours (or 54 with approval of the university).

Governors State will award upper level credit which can be used toward an undergraduate or graduate degree. There will be midterm and

final exams and monthly group discussions. For more information, call the university at 534-5000, extension 2441. Enrollment deadline is Oct. 8.
