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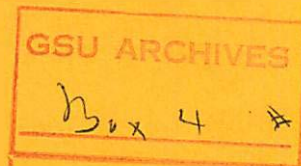

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT...ON COLLECTIVE BARGAINING: The Board's vote on November 20 granted faculty the right to have an election to determine whether they want collective bargaining in the first place. If the result of this election is affirmative, a second election will take place to determine the bargaining agent for the faculty.

This vote does not automatically grant collective bargaining rights to faculty; it sets in motion an election process that could lead to collective bargaining.

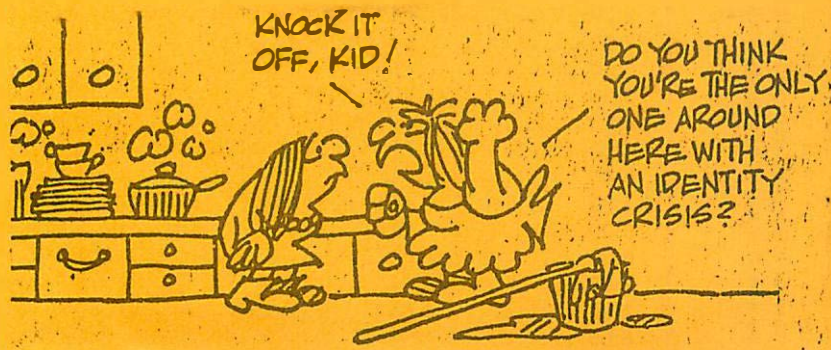
The Board instructed the Executive Officer to develop a set of procedures and guidelines for implementing their vote. Specifically, he is to present the Board at the January meeting with a set of detailed regulations on how the above two elections are to be conducted, as well as regulations or guidelines with respect to the entire conduct of collective bargaining negotiations following an election of a bargaining agent.
