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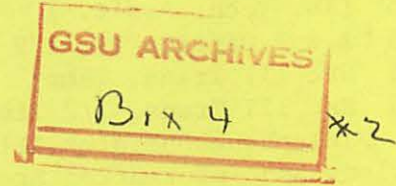

ASSEMBLY ELECTIONS ON THE HORIZON...The University Election Commission announces that it's time to begin preparations and plans for University Assembly elections. The elections will be held this year from Feb. 9 thru Feb. 14 with the Information Office as polling place.

The following Assembly positions are open:

2-Year Term: Faculty - 1 CCS, 1 HLD; Faculty-at-Large - 2; Student - 1 BPS, 1 CCS, 1 EAS, 1 HLD; Support - 2; Civil Service - 2.

1-Year Term: Student - 1 BPS, 1 EAS.

Those wishing to run should note that nominating petitions (requiring the names of 5% or 50 members of the constituency, whichever is fewer) are to be circulated from Jan. 12 thru Jan. 26 with a deadline of 9:30 a.m., Jan. 26. Nominating petitions may be picked up, starting the 12th, at the University Assembly office near University Relations or at the Information Desk. ICC ANNOUNCES NEW HOURS...Due to the extensive loss of equipment from the ICC over the last several months, it is regrettably necessary for the ICC to restrict the flow of traffic in and out of the ICC outside normal business hours. Accordingly, the front doors of the ICC will be closed to the general public at 5:00 p.m. each evening and all day on Saturdays, beginning on Monday, Jan. 19, 1976. The ICC will continue to maintain its full equipment delivery and production services in the evenings and on Saturdays but only ICC staff and those authorized for specific purposes will be allowed on the ICC premises during these hours. ICC regrets any inconvenience this new procedure may cause.

CEDA INVESTS \$100,000...Cleophus G. Young, Sr., Community and Economic Development Assn. Board President, presented a check for \$100,000 to the Harvey Area Action Program at The Open House meeting Wed., Dec. 3, 1975, attended by Mary Ella Robertson (CS) representing GSU. The check, along with staff and other resources from CEDA will supply one thrust of the approach HAAP is taking in the Harvey area. In a joint effort between Governors State University and business and community people from Harvey, Blue Island, Posen, Phoenix, Dixmoor and Markham to relieve depression in the Harvey area, CEDA has developed the Harvey Area Action Program (HAAP), to coordinate existing efforts and plan additional service programs. This concerted approach represents not only cash and resources from CEDA, but also a considerable commitment from GSU. GSU's contributions include:

--the establishment of an outpost of the University in Harvey, where classes and cultural events will be offered;

--donation of the time of students and faculty to help develop and direct the project;

--appointment of the director of HAAP to a staff position at GSU (the director also holds a CEDA staff position);

--research and studies of the particular needs of the Harvey area.

IPA MOBILITY PROGRAM...The Intergovernmental Personnel Act (IPA) Mobility Program, U.S. Civil Service Commission enables government agencies to borrow and lend talent for up to two years as assignees increase their program knowledge and gain experience in other administrative environments. As a result of the program, over 800 college and university faculty and staff have come into the Federal government (a one-to-one exchange is not required). University employees may be assigned on "detail" or leave without pay when joining the rolls of the Federal agency but maintain local job rights with costs (including salary, benefits, travel, etc.) shared or borne by either jurisdiction--subject to negotiation. University employees receive up to \$30,000 per year depending upon assignment, agency involved, and employees' local status. Assignments may be awarded along with sabbatical leave programs. Individual faculty members are responsible for making their own contracts and arrangements. For further info, contact Bob Krebs, ext. 2348.
