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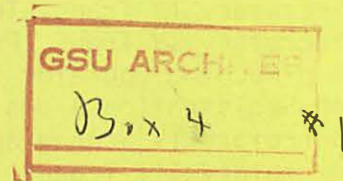

POPULATION RESEARCH REFUNDED...The Ford and Rockefeller Foundations have announced that they will continue support in 1977 for their annual program of social science research relevant to population policy. Emphasis this year will be on the reciprocal relationships between population policy and social and economic development. The program is open to researchers at all levels, including junior scholars and graduate students, but all applicants must have demonstrated research ability, knowledge of population and development issues, and previous experience in these or closely related fields. The program is expected to be quite competitive, with only about 15 percent of the applications (or 35-40 projects) selected for funding. For further information, contact Bill Dodd, ext. 2122.

GRADUATION '76...WHEN AND HOW...The commencement ceremony will be held August 22, 1976 for students who applied for graduation and completed degree requirements for the July-August 1975 Session, Fall 1975 Trimester, Winter 1976 Trimester and May-June 1976 Block. Students planning to complete degree requirements during the May-June 1976 Block or the May-August 16-week Block must make application to their colleges on or prior to May 13, 1976. A Student Progress Report Form must also be submitted by that date. Students who complete graduation requirements during the July-August 1976 Block will not participate in the August 22nd commencement ceremony. Only students who have completed degree requirements by the end of the May-June 1976 Block will be allowed to participate in the commencement ceremony.

BPS TESTING ALL NEW STUDENTS...The Quantitative Foundations for Business Administration and Written Communications competency examinations have been mandatory since September, 1973 for all undergraduate students. As a result of recent collegial assembly action, all BPS students, including graduates and undergraduates admitted to the college for the Spring Trimester, 1976 will be required to take the examinations. If you are unsure of your status regarding these examinations, contact your adviser. The tests will be given in Room A1102 on Tues., March 16 at 5:30-7:30 p.m., and Wed., March 17, 1:30-3:30 p.m. and 5:30-7:30 p.m.

GSU GRADS UNWAIVERED BY TRADITION...According to a recent R&E survey, GSU students have a more realistic perception of what education is, after experiencing competency-based instruction at GSU. A study of student transition from non-traditional to traditional educational programs found that graduates matriculating to traditional schools do not experience undue hardship, nor do they experience any abated rate of academic success. Former GSU students now in traditional graduate schools responded that their median grade point average was 3.5 on a 4.0 scale, with the range being 3.0 to 4.0.

ALLOTTA, HAYNES, AND JEREMIAH...Folk trio will perform at GSU Thurs., March 25. A-H-J run the gamut from quiet blues to cowboy songs to "Okie from Muskogee" to old Eddie Cantor numbers. Jeremiah plays piano and the guitarists are Allotta and Haynes. The trio has two albums to their credit and frequent appearances at the Gate of Horn, Ratso's, and other Chicago spots. Haynes, aside from his guitar work and voice, is noted for dialects and a Second City way of telling jokes. Admission for students will be \$1.00, alumni \$1.75, and all others \$2.00 for the public program at 7:30 p.m. in the Community Conference Center.



GSU-PFS SHUTTLE...Direct bus service between GSU and the Park Forest South residential area will begin Monday, March 15, as a result of the survey conducted last week in FAZE-1. PFS Village Manager Charles Notarus has announced that the new shuttle service will be provided at a special low fare of 30¢ per ride. The run will be made twice daily, timed to arrive at GSU at 8:25 a.m., and leaving GSU at 5:10 p.m. The morning bus will pick up riders anywhere along the route (see map), and in the evening will stop wherever requested. Time in transit will range from 10 minutes to 25 minutes, depending on where one is picked up or discharged. To avoid confusion with the GSU bus to the train station, the Village buses will be clearly marked "GSU-PFS Shuttle."

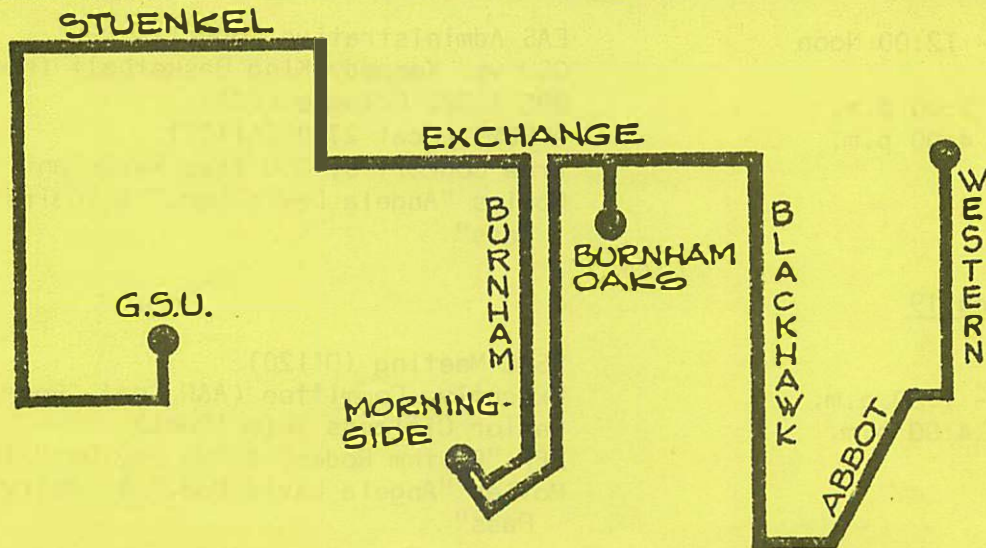

- A. COMMITTEE ON EDUCATIONAL POLICIES AND PROGRAMS
This committee will generate policies on all educational matters that are University-wide in nature and will review educational policies and programs referred to it by collegial, support, or other budgeted units.
- B. COMMITTEE ON FISCAL RESOURCES
This committee will generate policies on financial matters that are University-wide and will review matters on fiscal policies developed by budgeted units.
- C. COMMITTEE ON THE FUTURE
This committee will generate guidelines and policies to direct the University toward what it should be. Five-year and ten-year plans will be in continuous development.
- D. COMMITTEE ON GOVERNANCE
