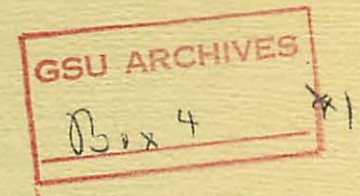

DR. WINSTON APPOINTED BPS ACTING DEAN...
Effective September 1, Dr. Ralph J. Winston will be acting dean of BPS. Dr. Winston, a university professor of accounting and business, will succeed Dean Ruben V. Austin, who has been invited to accept a distinguished visiting professorship at the University of South Carolina in the College of Business Administration. Prior to coming to GSU in 1971, Dr. Winston was at the Wisconsin State University in Oshkosh. Born and educated in Chicago, he is a former Chicago auditor and Certified Public Accountant as well as being a CPA in Missouri and Montana. He has been active as a lecturer, lecturing extensively overseas, and as a panelist and moderator for accounting, education and business conferences. In addition he has authored several books and articles. Dr. Winston received B.S.B.A. and M.B.A. degrees from Northwestern University and D.B.A. from Washington University.

SCHOLARSHIP HONORS PRESIDENT...A \$1,000 scholarship for students of sculpture has been established by SSAC in the name of William E. Engbretson, retiring President of GSU. A spokesman for SSAC stated, "The students chose this way to honor the President because of his oft-expressed desire to make GSU a showcase of fine art, and for the effort he has exerted towards that end." Dr. Engbretson was surprised with the announcement at a farewell party given for him by GSU students on August 5.

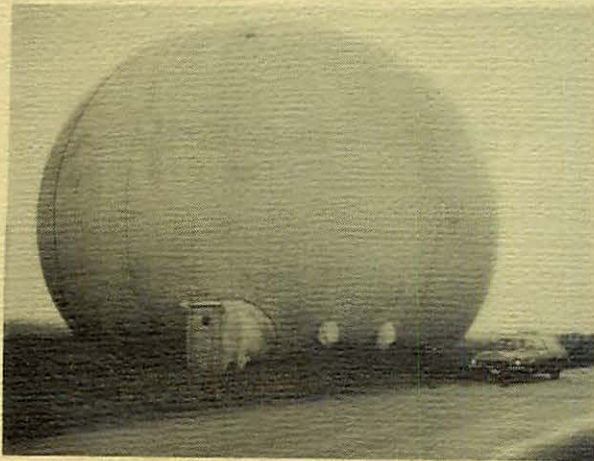

CO-OP ED POSITIONS...The U.S. Office of Education in Washington, D.C. has three cooperative education positions available for GSU students. To qualify, students must be undergraduates with academic majors in education, journalism, English, accounting, history, social science, or psychology. DID YOU KNOW?...Have you noticed what seems to be a giant beachball dropped between the Planning Building and the Hantack House? Have no fear, we have not been invaded. The balloon-type structure is a radar dome designed to protect radar towers from high winds. The radar tower located there is one link in a two-system radar survey (the other link is at the Illinois Institute of Technology) being conducted by Illinois State Water Survey to study hydrological and air pollution problems of the Chicago Metropolitan area. The SWS and EAS will study the impact of air pollution on water pollution. The SWS radar will be located at GSU about six months each year from 1976 through 1982. This is its second trip to GSU.

UWW provides an alternative system for attaining a B.A. degree that fits individual needs. Characterized by an individualized experiential approach, the program combines a competency-based liberal arts core with a major area of specialization. DR. SITARAM ACCEPTS POSITION AT UTAH STATE U.... Dr. K. S. Sitaram, University Professor of Communication Science in HLD, has accepted the position of Chairman of the Department of Communication at Utah State University. He will head a 15 member department at Logan offering bachelor's and master's degrees in communication, broadcasting, and journalism. Dr. Sitaram was appointed from more than 70 candidates. An authority in intercultural communication, he has recently written a book on a second one. He is Vice President of the International Communication Association and founder of its intercultural division. Dr. Sitaram received a B.S. degree from the University of Mysore and a M.S. and Ph.D. from the University of Oregon. He has been with GSU since 1974.

"EAST LYNNE" TO BE PRESENTED... East Lynne or Lady Isabel's Shame written by Brian Burton and based on the novel by Mrs. Henry Wood is a 19th century Victorian Melodrama. It is the tale of Lady Isabel, played by Judy Mullady of Momence, who is cunningly seduced by the villainous Francis Levison, played by Nemiah Matthews of Chicago, into believing that the clandestine meetings of her husband, Archibald, played by Chuck Smith of Chicago, and another woman, Barbara Hare played by Kristin Becker of Steger, are for romance rather than business. In despair and being easy prey to the blandishments of the villain, she abandons her home and children, only to come back years later disguised as a governess. BUT WHAT OF THE CHILDREN?... It's time for you to leave for class and the babysitter calls saying she can't make it today; you have to look for work but you still have a pre-schooler at home; you work every day, who watches the older children on school holidays? If you have any of these problems, there is a place where you can get help--the GSU Day Care Center. Language arts, dramatic play, music and rhythm, creative arts, science, math, games, outdoor recreation, and tutoring are offered on a full-time, part-time, or drop-in basis to children at Governors State Child Care Center. Full-time rates for children per week include lunch and snacks and are \$20 where gross total income is under \$7,000, \$25 for \$7,000-\$14,000 and \$30 for over \$14,000. Part-time weekly rates include lunch, snacks and are \$13, \$16 and \$20. Drop-in rates include snacks and are 75¢ an hour. In discussion of parent involvement, Director Steve Heller stated: "We at the Center want and welcome two-way communication. We hope parents will feel free to get involved.
