WANTED: ATTRACTIVE, ATHLETIC, WHOLESOME, WELL-SCRUBBED, OUTDOOR TYPE...Auditions for the female role in Neil Simon's "A Star Spangled Girl" will be held Sept. 14, 15, and 16 in the Drama Workshop at 7:30 p.m. The opening show of the GSU Theatre Season is being presented as a Production/Workshop. The two male roles in the cast of 3 will be filled by two professional Chicago actors under a "Guest Artist" contract with Actor's Equity. The female roll will be filled by open audition. Director of the play, Mel M. Slott, GSU Professor of Theatre, says he is looking for a fairly attractive, athletic, wholesome, well-scrubbed, outdoor type with some acting experience. The character has age flexibility between 20 and 30 years old. "This is a good opportunity," says Slott, "for a student or community person to work in a professional atmosphere. All actresses in the area are invited to audition. Local high school and junior college theatre students are to be invited to attend rehearsals either in the late afternoon or evening as workshop participants. At the end of each rehearsal period the actors and director will respond to questions about acting and directing processes and techniques. Productions are set for Oct. 29-30 and Nov. 5, 6, 7. CCS SAD CHOSEN...New "SAD"--student assistant dean--in the College of Cultural Studies is Arthur ("Turk") Burton of Phoenix. A graduate student in ethnic studies, Turk is a percussionist in the GSU Jazz ensemble on music scholarship. He is a member of the Association for the Advancement of Creative Musicians, and on the board of directors of the Center of Independent Learning in Harvey. CCS' SAD also served as former president of the Black student union UHURU at Thornton Community College.

"WOMEN: ORGANIZING FOR CHANGE"...A two-day workshop will be held at GSU on Sept. 17, 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and also on Dec. 3 from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Between these two dates a practicum will be given by Heather Booth, Director of the Midwest Academy and a leading contributor to the women's and social change movements. The workshop is designed for individual women and organizations who want to become more effective social change agents. "Women are coming to understand the need for change and their own potential for successfully organizing to redress discrimination and inequities of the past" according to Harriet Gross, Women's Studies Coordinator. GENERAL EDUCATION--BETTER? Author Tibor Scitovsky, a Stanford Univ. economist, states in his book The Joyless Economy that "America's work ethic pressures students into work and production-related studies that impart skills which frequently are not used." The current emphasis upon work-related education in college occurs at the expense of the more general studies which would enable a graduate to enjoy the surroundings of his or her culture, such as obtaining knowledge of art, music, literature, and other general cultural areas which would make life more enjoyable. Scitovsky maintains that only "generalists" can achieve a satisfactory life because they are aware of opportunities available, and that "the modern American consumer is a poor generalist."

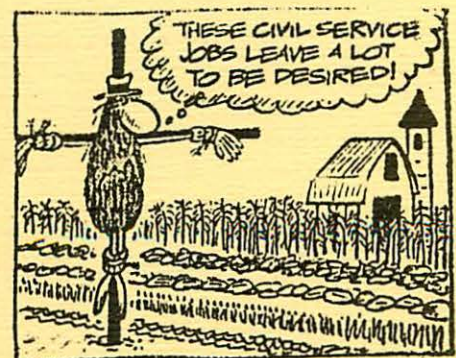
