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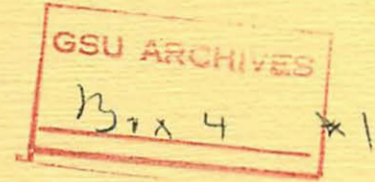

**OFFICIALS VISIT...**Some 200 government officials will attend a workshop on the new public works employment act at GSU Wednesday, Sept. 29. The State of Ill. Department of Local Government Affairs will conduct the southwest workshop for local officials from general purpose governments and special districts from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. In cooperation with the Northeastern Illinois Planning commission and the Illinois Municipal league, the meeting will review the legislative and program guidelines of the newly enacted public works employment act. President Leo Goodman-Malamuth will welcome the group. Further info may be obtained from Charles Mosley, acting Vice-President of Community Services, whose office arranged the workshop.

"Life is a choice between marching in place or moving forward," says William Berry, new faculty member in CCS, and he chose to move forward by joining the GSU community this fall.

Berry said he was attracted to GSU "Because it is a place on the move; there is nothing static about it--it is not locked into any kind of traditionalism that hinders progress."

Berry was also drawn by the opportunities presented in the Popular Culture Program in CCS and by the fact that GSU is the only state school that offers both a BA and MA degree in Mass Media.

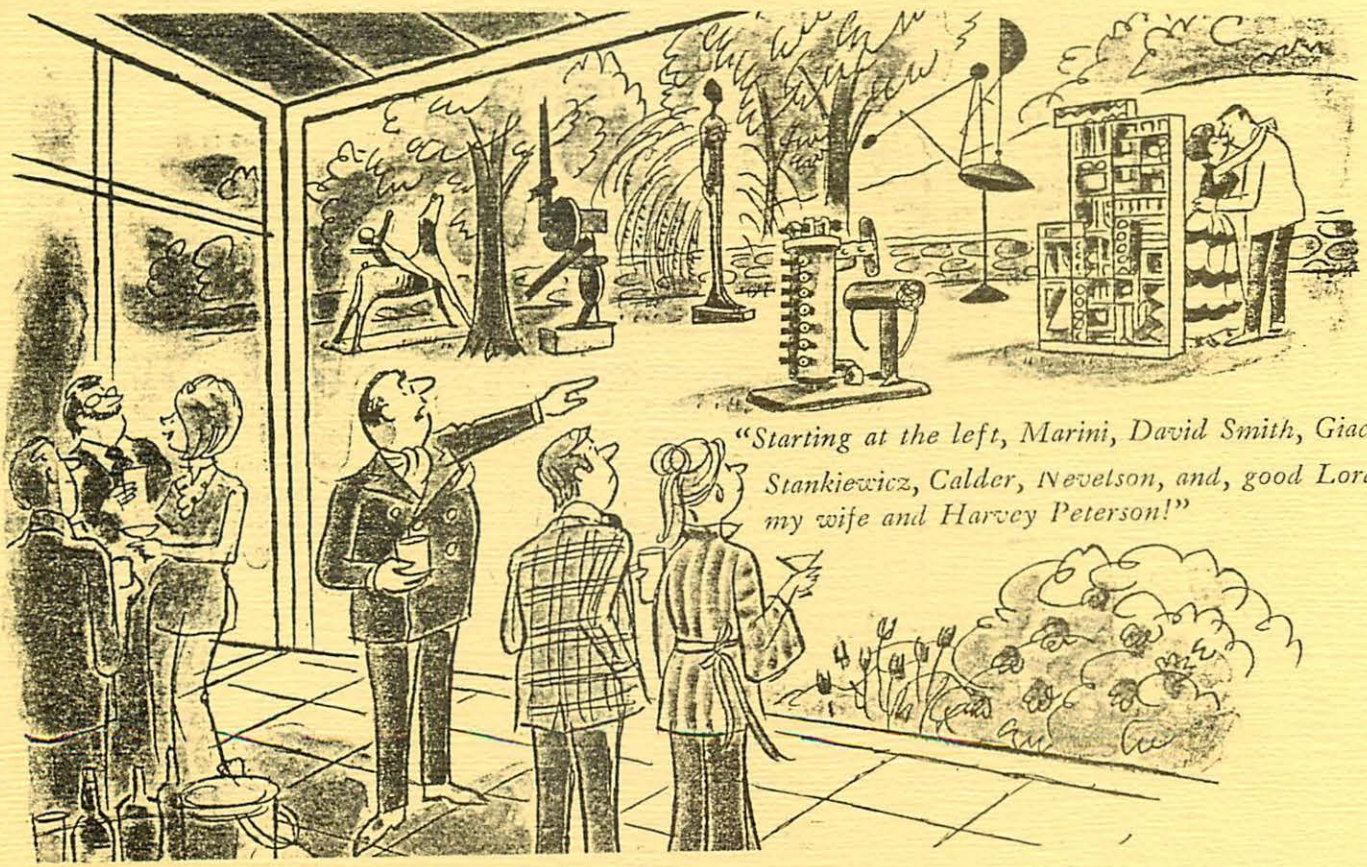
Now teaching journalism classes, he hopes to see a writing laboratory developed here; a simulated newsroom where students will learn how to handle news stories--from rough facts to finished copy, under pressure of a deadline. "Writing is something that must be done," he said. "To be a writer, you must write, you can't just learn the theory of it." He also feels that a writing lab would give the student a realistic picture of what employers will expect on a job.

Berry would like to see courses developed in the Mass Media program that would give students a broader understanding of the history of communications and all the forces and influences that have shaped the media world as it is today.

Comparing GSU to more traditional schools, he said, "There is a vitality here, a freshness that stems from the innovation of new ideas, new courses, and new methods. Traditional schools are caught in the trap of teaching the same thing the same way, year after year. That is not the case here at GSU. There is a challenge of change, which is invigorating." And as far as the students themselves are concerned he said that they are sincere, a measure of their sincerity can be taken by the distance some of them commute each day to pursue their education.

Berry came to GSU from The Central YMCA College in Chicago where he was Acting Chairman of the English Department and Journalism instructor.

He is a Ph.D. candidate (in Mass Media) at the University of Illinois where he also received a M.S. in Journalism. He earned a B.A. at Morehouse University in Atlanta, Georgia, and has also studied at Harvard University, New York University and the University of Durham in Durham, England.
