NEW ACTING VP FOR ADMINISTRATION... Raymond B. Kiefer has become acting Vice-President of Administration at GSU, replacing Thomas Layzell. Kiefer came to GSU in 1971, serving as Business Manager and University Professor of Administration in the College of Business & Public Service. Prior to 1971 he was with Washington University in St. Louis as Director of Procurement and contract administration for 10 years. While in Missouri he was also a budgetary analysis consultant for the Missouri Commission on Higher Education. Before joining Washington Univ. he was with the Cook County School of Nursing in Chicago, the Inter-American University in Puerto Rico, and the University of Akron. Kiefer is assistant treasurer of the GSU Foundation and was recently elected President of the Park Forest Rotary Club. He is also a recognized authority on antiques and speaks occasionally on this subject. He was graduated from the University of Akron where he majored in industrial management and studied marketing and retailing. Richard D. Struthers, Director of Purchasing and Ass't. Business Manager has now become acting Business Manager for the University.

DID YOU KNOW...that ICC is developing a slide-tape program for the Association for Educational Communications and Technology (AECT), to be shown at the Association's national convention in Miami, Florida next April. The program will be developed around the Domain of Educational Technology (DET). The author of the DET, Ken Silber (HLD) and John Johnson (ICC), who are presently writing a book concerning the DET, will act as subject matter consultants. After the convention two filmstrips will be developed from the presentation and they will be marketed by AECT.

SCULPTURE ARRIVES..."Legion XII," the first of four small sculptures acquired through the Illinois Arts Council has arrived at GSU. The aluminum sculpture, by Maryrose Pilcher of Evanston, will be displayed in CCS. The remaining three works to be acquired and permanently displayed are: "Sandia II," by Dennis Kawalski, "Organic Study," by Minna Reich, and an untitled work by Charles Wilson. Initiated in February, the permanent collection purchase program of the Illinois Arts Council was designed to stimulate recognition of Illinois artists and to encourage the growth of permanent collections in Illinois institutions. Similar in structure to the National Endowment for the Arts museum purchase plan, the IAC program is the first of its kind to function on a state level.

HIGH SCHOOL NEWSPAPER CONFERENCE...GSU will host students from 28 high schools Tues., Dec. 7 at a newspaper conference sponsored by the South Inter-Conference Association (SICA). Conference classes will include features/ideas, interviewing techniques, layout, practical photography and staff advisor relations.

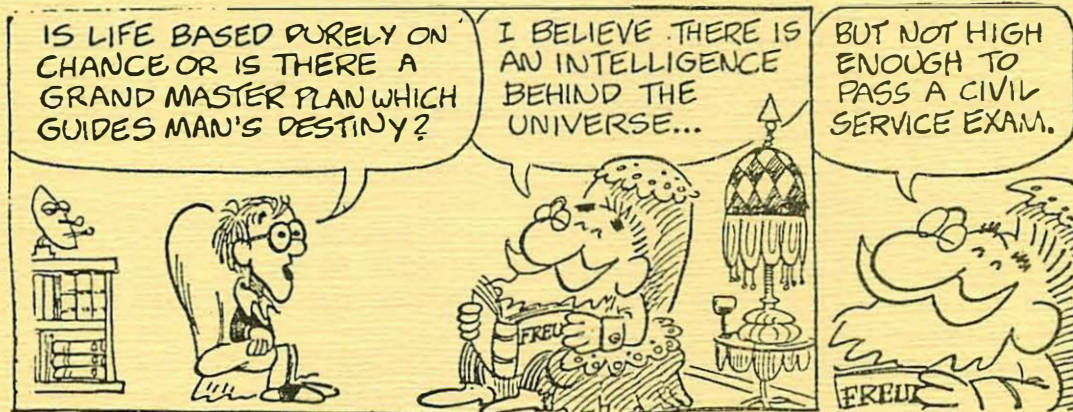
