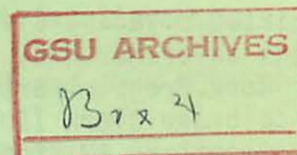

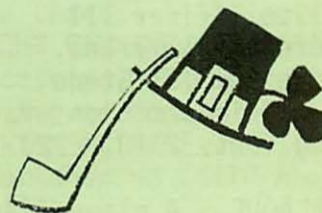

REGISTRATION TIME...Advance registration for the Spring/Summer Trimester is being held March 15-April 15. The admission application deadline for the S/S Trimester is April 8. On-campus registration is slated for May 2-3 and June 30. Students may now use a valid Master Charge credit card (limit-\$300) for tuition and fee payments. AND SPEAKING OF TUITION...A 62 per cent tuition increase approved by the BOG last month will become effective in September at GSU. The increase raises tuition from \$13.25 per unit to \$21.25 for undergraduate students. To offset this increase the University is investigating reductions in school-related costs. Under consideration are the annual \$35 parking fee and \$15 per Trimester activity fee. The cuts would be made in order to maintain GSU's mandate to serve low-income and minority students.

LECTURE SERIES CONTINUES...David Ainsworth, Director of Chicago Metropolitan Higher Education Council will speak March 16 at 2:30 p.m. in Rm. A1102 on "Competency-Based Education Blues." The talk will explore implementation of the competency-based education system at GSU and examine its usefulness as a tool for determining curricula and for bringing precision into the instructional process. Four broad themes have been determined for upcoming lectures: Environmental and Energy Concerns; Decision-making Processes; Intercultural and Cross-Cultural Perspectives and Educational Alternatives. GO FLY A KITE IN EAS...Eight times a day and twice at night EAS hoists a red kite to take readings on altitude, wind speed, direction and temperature, as part of research conducted under an Environmental Protection Agency Grant. This highly sophisticated kite carries equipment which transmits radio signals relaying information on airborne particulate matter (pollution) to a computer printout. This part of the three-year study is designed to answer important scientific questions about the atmospheric routes of pollution in the Great Lakes, including the process by which particles in the atmosphere are transported over Lake Michigan and deposited on the surface of the lake. Mike Eason, EAS, is directing the kite study.

GSU ABROAD...Berlin is the site for a course on "Explorations in Self, Culture and Communication" offered by GSU May 28-June 4. Tulsı Saral will coordinate the course which can be taken for three to six units of advanced undergraduate or graduate credit. The learning module will be offered in conjunction with the International Communication Association Annual Conference and the International Congress on Communication Sciences. GLOBAL AFFAIRS CONVENING IN MIDWEST...Three large conferences are being held this month in the Chicago area in co-operation with GSU. Meeting at GSU on Sat. March 19-20 is the Third World Workshop sponsored by the College of Cultural Studies. Featured Speakers from the University of Chicago, Hunter College, City Colleges of New York, Rutgers University, Howard University and GSU will be heard. "New Problems and Dimensions in the Third World," theme of the program, will also be discussed by representatives from the Chicago Sun-Times, Department of Health Education and Welfare and the Illinois Human Relations Commission. A World Affairs Conference will be held March 25-26 at the Holiday Inn in Harvey. "Southern Africa: What's Happening?" is the theme for keynote speakers. Scheduled to speak are His Excellency, Paul Bomani, Ambassador to the U.S. from Tanzania; the Honorable Jeremy B. Shearer, Minister of the South African Embassy in Washington, D.C., and U.S. Senator Joseph R. Biden, Jr. of Delaware. Live from the Midwest, a conference to explore energy and community alternatives will be held at the University of Illinois, Chicago Circle Campus, March 18-19. Keynote speaker for the conference is E.F. Schumacher, author of "Small is Beautiful: Economics as if People Mattered." The Midwest Energy Alternative Network at GSU and the Illinois Humanities Council are sponsoring the conference.
