4. Signify your choice for Secretary by writing an "X" in the appropriate box on the ballot.
5. Ballots will be counted at 10 a.m. Friday, Sept. 16, 1977 in the BPS Conference Room. All candidates are invited to observe.

FIRST FALL RECAP...In his opening address for the First Fall Faculty meeting, President Leo Goodman-Malamuth cited administrative reorganization, closer community college ties, and successful recruiting as some of the goals reached this past year by the University. After the introduction of new faculty members by their Deans and a brunch-break, the President introduced new Provost Dr. Curtis McCray, who spoke on the need for education which goes beyond mere "job training" and effectively prepares students for individual freedom and a productive community. Expressing delight in coming to GSU, McCray encouraged all present to work together toward a bright future for the University. Dr. Aida Shekib, Chairperson of the University Assembly followed, leading a discussion of University governance. Representatives of each constituency were introduced and spoke: for students, Maudstine Macon (student rep to BOG); for Civil Service, Bob Jensen (Cent. Stores); for support, Bill Katz (HLD); and for faculty, Roscoe Perritt (BPS).
