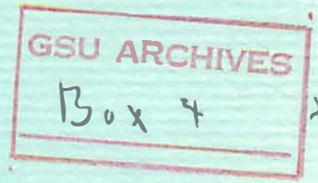

Perhaps best known for the UNESCO "Statement of Race," which he helped to draw up, and for his book, "The Natural Superiority of Women," noted anthropologist, social biologist and author Ashley Montagu will speak at GSU March 8.

A popularizer of science, Dr. Montagu has ventured into such sensitive areas as race, the relations between the sexes, and child rearing. The UNESCO "Statement of Race" reported the consensus of authoritative and enlightened scientific thought on race, and related it to social doctrines and behavior. The program is free and open to the public.

NO ROOM FOR ROMANCE . . .

"Bantu Social System Controls--No Room for Romeo and Juliet" will be discussed by Luyimbazi Zake at the next Faculty Research Seminar to be held March 1, 2:30 p.m. in Room E1104.

The view is that Romeo and Juliet merely represent expressions of the love sentiment in western cultures which are culturally controlled, while Bantu social structures do not allow them to play Romeo and Juliet.

This raises questions on the universality of Shakespeare.

Dr. Zake is University Professor of Cultural Anthropology in CCS.

FAZE FOCUS ON . . . HECTOR ORTIZ



Stepping into the office of Hector Ortiz is an instant cure for the winter doldrums. The atmosphere of the room fairly crackles with the energy generated by a spirit of optimism and enthusiasm. A visitor cannot help but come away encouraged and refreshed.

Ortiz has been with the University nearly a year. At present he is serving in two capacities, Director of the Human Services Resource Center and Interim Director of Community Services.

Formerly an administrator with the Chicago Committee on Urban Opportunities, Ortiz said "I came to GSU because of a tremendous sense of challenge; there is a great possibility here for development of a program that will be second to none."

As Director of the Human Services Resource Center, Ortiz keeps an up-to-date listing of all Human Service agencies in his assigned territory. This includes Cook, Will, Kankakee, Kendall and Grundee Counties. He keeps close personal contact

with the directors of the various agencies in order to effectively provide immediate help to someone needing their services.

His office also provides a great deal of help to students who use the wealth of agency information available to them for research. Frequently students are assigned temporary positions with particular agencies who need research assistance. "These assignments have a two-fold purpose," Ortiz said. "It serves students by helping them complete projects toward their degree and serves the agency by filling a need for quality work. I see this as a plus for the University in terms of fostering good will in the community."

As Interim Director of Community Services, Ortiz has strong feelings on the subject of service. Characteristically choosing his words with care, he said "community service at GSU has seen many changes since the early days. We are working to correct the impression that we are a welfare program. When people come to us for help, we try to give them the tools to obtain what they want through teaching, training and guiding." He continued, "Many groups have all the resources to help themselves, but they need technical assistance and direction. That is our job--our service to the community."

He views Community Services as the arm and hand of the University, while the four Colleges are the body and support. One cannot work without the other.

Hector's leisure time is filled with his duties as a consultant in urban affairs for various churches, including Seventh Day Adventist, Chicago Presbytery, United Church of Christ, Northern Baptist Theological Seminary, and the Mennonites.

His varied background includes experience as a teacher, pastor, and youth worker. He also speaks and writes both Spanish and Greek.

Looking forward at GSU, Hector says "I feel the future is bright, and I see many good things happening." Careful, GSU. That kind of excitement and enthusiasm may be catching.
