STUDIES IN TRANSPORTATION . . .

An innovative transportation systems class is being offered at GSU beginning with the Fall Trimester.

A full range of transportation problems in a regional intermodal context such as the RTA, will be covered in the class beginning Sept. 5.

The curriculum includes seminars and visits to Chicago area transportation facilities as well as guest lectures by transportation experts from government agencies and businesses.

Instructing the class will be Paul Dillon, community professor (EAS). Dillon is Vice-president and Director of the Economic Research Division of the Mid-America Appraisal and Research Corporation in Chicago. Cooperating professor will be Efraim Gil (EAS).

Advance registration will continue thru Aug. 15. Students may also register Aug. 31 on campus.
