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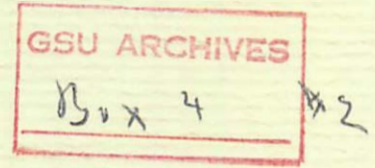

**FIRST FALL REPORT . . .**

High hopes for the coming year were expressed by President Goodman-Malamuth in his opening remarks for GSU's annual First Fall Faculty Meeting, held last Wednesday. After welcoming the faculty, he reviewed various accomplishments of the past year and shared with the group his BOG-requested goals for the University.

Dr. Goodman-Malamuth praised the summer work of the Constitutional Convention, but noted that he entertained some substantive questions about the newly-ratified Constitution and announced that the University Assembly would remain operative until December 31. The Constitutional Convention is to be reconvened within a few weeks. At this meeting he will discuss his concerns with the convention delegates. It is hoped that all difficulties can be ironed out in time for the Constitution to be presented to the BOG in October. Senate elections would then be held in Nov-Dec.

After an introduction of new administrative and faculty staff, University Assembly Chairperson Aida Shekib encouraged enthusiastic participation in University governance. She noted that the four additional months of Assembly operation would not be a time for indifference. Historically, demands on the University's governance system have been heaviest during the Fall Trimester.

Following a break, discussion of academic leadership was introduced by Dr. Roy Cogdell, who shared his personal philosophy of leadership; Marv Brotzman, who discussed several styles of academic leadership; and Peggy Williams, who discussed leadership from the perspective of revitalizing teacher education.

FIRST FALL REPORT CONT. . . .

A general disucssion yielded suggestions for a four-month governance holiday, and since enrollment was down, faculty involvement in recruitment. One faculty member noted at the end of the discussion that she had not heard mention of the word "democratic" throughout the entire discussion of academic leadership.

Provost Curtis McCray then shared with the group some "concerns."

His first concern: low enrollment and the impact on the University, given current IBHE stance (GSU is either over-staffed or under-enrolled).

A second concern: the impact of "reallocation" (the BHE medicine for an under-enrolled institution) on programming and on a "university" education. What is a full-service university? In the process of reallocation, how shall we preserve "full-service" and avoid excessive imbalances?

Dr. McCray also reviewed the substantial progress made since May on several internal fronts identified at that time. He also suggested that, externally, we must begin to market more effectively. This might well mean a formal recruitment office as well as a total "marketing plan" for GSU.

In closing, McCray reiterated his strong commitment to liberal education:

"We do see as though through a glass darkly. The truth is ill-perceived at best. But, I refuse to yield to modern irrationalism that presents humankind as some blind beast making history without having any conscios idea of what it really wants or under what conditions it would stop being unhappy.

Rather, I would say with Thoreau that I went to the academy because I wished to live deliberately, to front on the essential facts of life, and see if I could not learn what it had to teach, and not, when I came to die, discover that I had not lived."
