#### PRESIDENT APPROVES CONSTITUTION . . .

Following a meeting Thursday, November 9, with Convention Chairperson Bill Katz (HLD) and the Convention Executive Committee, President Goodman-Malamuth approved the Constitution which was developed and ratified last summer. A few changes in the wording of the Constitution were requested by the President, changes deemed "non-substantive" by Katz and the Executive Committee. The Constitution will now be forwarded to legal counsel and the BOG for review. Copies of the final draft will be distributed following these reviews.

**STUDENT REPS ELECTED . . .** Phyllis E. Bacon has been elected as the BOG student representative and Carolyn Greer has been elected representative to the Student Advisory Council of the IBHE. Carolyn, a CCS grad student in the Media Communications program, is Associate Editor of the Innovator. Phyllis works as an A&R Officer II and attends classes as an HLD grad student enrolled in the Human Relations Services Program. Ms. Greer will be attending the SAC meeting at SIU-Edwardsville on Nov. 11, and Ms. Bacon will attend the BOG meeting at Northeastern University on Nov. 15 and 16. A total of 455 votes were cast in the elections, held Nov. 6-9.

#### GRADUATE FELLOWSHIPS . . .

Graduate fellowships for women for 1979-80 are being offered by the Educational Foundation of the American Association of University Women (AAUW). Dec. 15 is the application deadline for nearly 100 American Fellowships, with stipends ranging from \$3500 to \$9000 (for postdoctoral research), and for some 50 International Fellowships for women from other countries.

In addition to the dissertation and postdoctoral fellowships for women of the United States, the AAUW fellowships are also offered for the final year of study in law, medicine, veterinary medicine, architecture, dentistry, business and engineering.

AAUW's international fellowships assist scholars from other countries for advanced studies in the U.S. For the 1978-79 year the AAUW Educational Foundation has awarded nearly \$660,000 to 145 scholars selected from over 1900 well-qualified applicants.

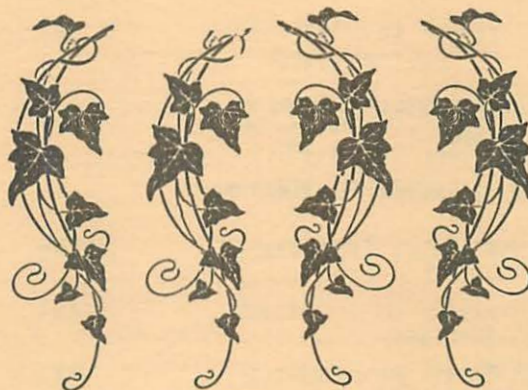
