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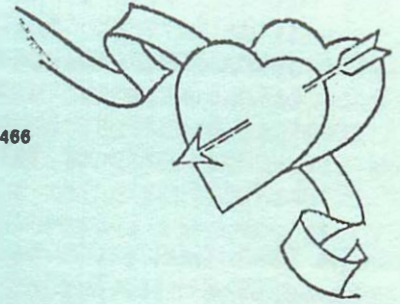

SPEAK OUT...Open hearings in Engbretson Hall have been called by SCEPP, the Standing Committee on Educational Policies and Procedures of the University Assembly. Two policies have been developed by SCEPP and will be discussed at the open hearings, February 16 and 20. Persons desiring to make formal presentations must register with the chairperson at the beginning of the meetings. Presentations will be limited to 10 minutes or less if necessary. Any and all written position papers and reactions will be incorporated into the proceedings of the hearing. After formal presentations, the remaining time will be used for informal presentations and discussion. The proceedings will be recorded. Copies of the proposed Faculty Workload Weights and Offsets Policy can be found in SCEPP minutes of January 22, and University Assembly minutes of January 25. Copies of the minutes and the proposed Student Grading Policy can be picked up at the office of the secretary for the University Assembly.

## FAZE FOCUS ON...WILLIAM WICKERSHAM



There aren't many people who can claim the responsibility for overseeing 750 acres of land, 444,000 square feet of building space, four lakes and three settling basins. As Superintendent of Building and Plant Operation (BPO) since 1973, Bill Wickersham is responsible for all of that and more. In direct charge of building and grounds maintenance and operations, he also oversees transportation, telecommunications and custodial maintenance on the GSU campus. And if that isn't enough, Bill is even more interested than the average GSUer in what each day's weather will bring. It's up to him to plan and implement the strategy to dig GSU out of the massive snow drifts that we've become so accustomed to this Winter. Bill sums up BPO and the four divisions encompassed by saying that he and the 59 people in that department see to it that GSU's personnel have what is needed to perform their duties well. When it snows, their main objective is to keep the roads open so that we can get into the parking lots. Of the recent blizzard's effects on snow removal, Bill remarks, "We have been able to keep the streets and parking lots in a minimum of personnel and equipment and with inadequate facilities for maintaining equipment." He continued, "My people have to try to repair equipment in sub-zero temperatures in an unheated barn" and complimented the personnel for their "stick-to-it-iveness" for getting the job done. Explaining that the problem which plagues this open area is snow drifts, he said that an area can be plowed and five minutes later, the drifts will be higher than ever. After this year's snow season has ended, Bill will begin an in-house study to evaluate the BPO equipment in preparation for next Winter.

With a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Illinois, Bill has credit toward a master's in business administration, concentrating on marketing and industrial management. A former United Airlines pilot, Navy aviation cadet and Marine Corps pilot, Bill is now working on the "Ph.D" of aviation - his license as a Single Engine Air Transport Pilot. He holds several aviation licenses (single, multi-engine land aircraft, ground instructor, commercial pilot, radiotelephone operator, flight instructor and flight engineer) and sees flying as a "means to a goal." His future will hinge on his expert aviation qualifications after he retires. Already an owner of several gliders and a company which has a glider school and an aerial advertising service, Bill will be well prepared for the years following retirement. Among those who have flown with Bill are President Goodman-Malamuth and some of the GSU vice-presidents.

A native of Harvey, Bill now resides in Flossmoor with his wife Janet, who is a secretary at Prairie State College. They have three daughters: Carol, a graduate of the University of Illinois now attending the Pacific School of Religion in San Francisco, Calif.; Nancy, a senior at the University of Illinois; and Ruth, a freshman at Northern Illinois University. Bill came to GSU in 1972 as Manager of Plant Operations. He was previously a program manager-administrator with General Electric Company in Burlington, Vermont and a project engineer at the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company in Akron, Ohio. He holds several patents on vulnerability protection devices for aircraft liquid systems. A past commander of a local Civil Air Patrol squadron and a Group II Operations officer, Bill likes to go fishing whenever he can find some free time.

Bill's office is located in Hantack House near the GSU Information Booth. He enjoys his responsibilities and acknowledges his operation as being essential to the continued progress of GSU. His comment: "The physical plant is, of course, here to serve the needs of the faculty, staff and students, and if it ever appears that we are neglecting any one of the three it is because of insufficient funds and staff to satisfy all needs to the degree desired, because of the necessary priorities established by the institution or by higher guidelines. We will continue to make every effort to satisfy each and every person's requirements to get their jobs done." With Bill, getting the job done and doing it well is very important. It's good to have GSUers like that.
