NOTICE...On all maps pinpointing the location of GSU, Lincoln Highway should also be identified as 211th Street so people will realize how far south GSU is from the city.

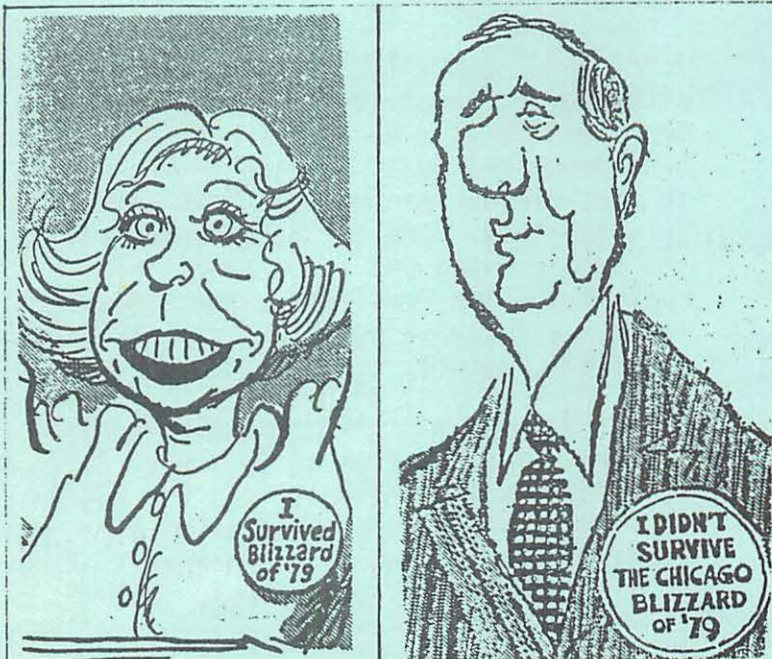

F A Z E F O C U S O N . . . Academic Reorganization at GSU

More than 100 persons participated in three hearings on the proposal for academic reorganization at GSU this week in Engbretson Hall. According to the structural description, the proposal calls for the reorganization of the current four Colleges and one School into three Colleges and one School. Essentially it proposes the merger of CCS and CEAS into a single College of Arts and Sciences; the reorganization of CHLD into a College of Education and Social Services; the renaming of the College of BPS to the College of Business and Public Administration; and maintenance of, as a separate unit, the School of Health Sciences, renaming it the School of Health Sciences and Nursing. Among the requests and comments made by faculty, staff and students were a number of recommendations to reconsider the placement of specific divisions within the various Colleges. The hearings were conducted by the University Academic Program Review Committee chaired by Dr. Otis Lawrence. Following the committee's review, their report of recommendations will be forwarded to the Provost's office where the proposal originated. The proposal is to go before the Board of Governors April 19 and before the Board of Higher Education May 1. Expected implementation date is September 1, 1979.

**No permanent slump in higher ed—Chambers**

Despite books, articles and speeches on "The New Depression," "The Sheepskin Psychosis" and "The Management of Decline," there has been no appreciable actual decrease in the total of students in higher education in recent years. Somewhat smaller enrollments in elementary and high schools do not necessarily mean future drops in colleges, for the simple reason that hardly more than half of the annual crop of high school graduates has ever yet gone on to any kind of higher education.

The present stage is called "mass higher education." We are in transition to another: "Universal higher education." Not only has the present decade

seen no actual losses; it has also seen gains in enrollments of women, of persons of minority races and of persons above conventional college age.

The 50 state legislatures continue to be the largest single source of annual operating funds for all higher education. The nationwide total of their appropriations of state tax funds for annual operating expenses increased from \$7 billion in 1972 to \$17 billion in 1979. The yearly rate of growth has generally been at least twice the prevailing rate of inflation at the time, thus indicating moderate real gains.

If we are to keep our manifold technology improving, promote international trade and tranquility, conserve natural resources and protect the environment, moderate the international arms race and

ameliorate the tendency toward overpopulation and world hunger, then we shall constantly be needing millions more of better-education people in schools, governments and private industries. We can never have too many.

In our time, the knowledge and discipline that are outcomes of higher education must be accessible to all the people. Government by the people requires that the people have opportunity to escape from ignorance, prejudice, bigotry and provincialism. More and better higher education for more people can lift the level of our whole way of life.

In the whole of education, nothing is as important as the quality of the teachers. Higher education is the producer of

better teachers. We are faced with the opportunity of the century—to upgrade teachers at all levels by doctoral and post-doctoral studies in every field.

Talk not of selling buildings, firing teachers, abolishing tenure or worse forms of "retrenchment." Talk instead of better-educated teachers, fewer pupils per teacher, better schools and expanded higher education. The scenario of the future is more and better higher education in all fields of knowledge. Its pecuniary cost will be recouped several times over.
