CANNING TO RETIRE . . .



John Canning, news relations professional for more than eight years at GSU, will retire from his position effective June 30. Assistant Director of University Relations, Mr. Canning is the senior citizen of the small group of founding staff members at the University. He has not yet announced his future professional

plans. He received his bachelor's degree from Grinnell College and his master's degree from Northwestern University. He has been with the Associated Press and an editor of several newspapers. Standard Oil Company retired him early after 35 years of service.

NEW HOURS . . . Effective April 13, 1979, the Office of Admissions will maintain the following office hours: Monday and Wednesday, 8:30 a.m. - 8 p.m.; Tuesday and Thursday, 9 a.m. - 8 p.m.; Friday, 8:30 a.m. - 5 p.m.; and Saturday, 8:30 a.m. - noon. Dean Frank Borelli has approved this change based on statistics gathered over a five-month period showing the amount of Friday evening traffic does not warrant the expense of keeping the office open until 8 p.m.

GRADING POLICY PROGRESS . . . The proposed Grading Policy passed by the Standing Committee on Educational Policies and Programs (SCEPP) underwent further hearings this week. Following any revisions, it will go to the University Assembly and then to the President. As approved by SCEPP, the proposal provides: standard letter grades (A, B, C, D, F) and "P" to show that specified competencies have been achieved; each course syllabus is to clearly define the basis for each grade; an undergraduate may choose to take up to 12 credit hours of elective courses on a pass-incomplete basis; graduate students must maintain a "B" average and undergraduates a "C" average to be in good standing; available will be a transcript with no grades, listing work completed and competencies achieved, and a transcript listing all course work, corresponding grades or status and grade point average; students may request either or both.

THE MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY . . . program regrets the loss of Marianne (Meg) Martlink, Adjunct Clinical Professor in Immunohematology at St. James Hospital. Ms. Martlink had been associated with the GSU Medical Technology program since its inception five years ago. Ms. Martlink passed away suddenly April 9. Meg was highly regarded by students and faculty; she devoted much energy and time to the program.

TUITION INCREASE . . . The Board of Governors approved a tuition increase at state colleges and universities at the March 22 meeting: for full-time students, increased tuition in the amount of \$48 for in-state undergraduate students; \$64 for in-state graduate students; \$144 for out-of-state undergraduate students; \$192 for out-of-state graduate students. For part-time students carrying less than 12 credit hours, tuition was increased per credit hour: \$2 per credit hour for in-state undergraduate students; \$2.75 per credit hour for in-state graduate students; \$6 per credit hour for out-of-state undergraduate students; \$8 per credit hour for out-of-state graduate students. Statistics show tuition fees are rising across the country. The higher-than-ever rates are attributed to inflation.

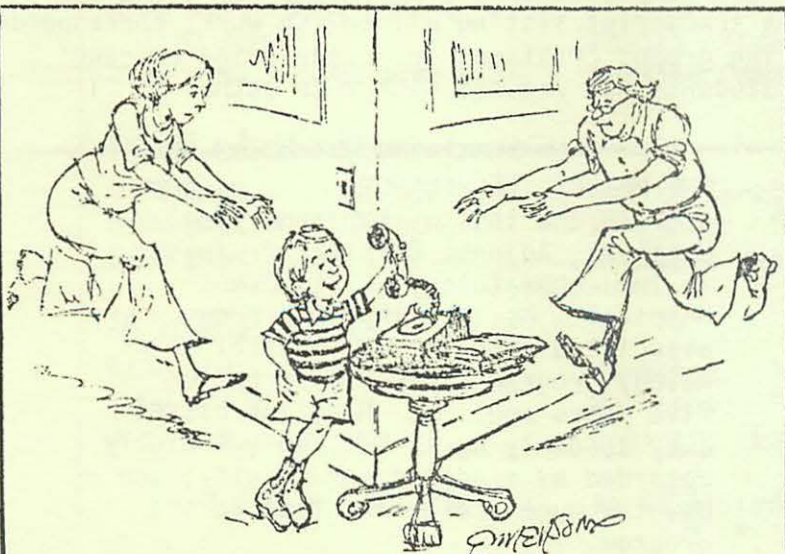

F A Z E F O C U S O N . . . JOSEPH FURGAL



Among GSUers is one who is responsible for fielding questions and relating information to about eight per cent of the University's personnel. Joe Furgal, as CETA Coordinator, administers the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) program at GSU. Dealing with the Will-Grundy CETA Consortium and Cook County as prime sponsors, Joe secures personnel slots for GSU by writing proposals based on federal guidelines. He monitors and reports on programmatic and fiscal compliance and develops training programs for employees unit heads and supervisors. Providing personnel support, he recruits, screens, interviews, hires, orientates and terminates CETA participants. Lessening the burden on state dollars, CETA-supported salaries have amounted to over \$200,000 this year.

Coming to GSU last August, Joe received a joint appointment. As University Professor of Human Services, he has taught Community Psychology and guest lectured in several courses including Generic Human Services. He will be instructing a new course, Resource Development and Grantsmanship, in the Spring/Summer Trimester. Joe has developed a "one to three hour road show" on proposal writing and grantsmanship which he uses to conduct classes and workshops.

Proposal writing has been an integral part of Joe's past positions. Before coming to GSU, Joe was acting housing coordinator of the Community and Economic Development Association of Cook County, Inc. (CEDA). He was previously area director of CEDA's services for Southwestern Cook County. He has also been a planning assistant with the Council for Community Services and an audio visual aids technician at the University of Illinois at Circle Campus.

A certified social worker, Joe received his bachelor's degree in psychology and his master's degree in social work, with an emphasis in Community Development and Planning, from the University of Illinois at Circle Campus. His associate degree in business administration is from Chicago's Wright Junior College. He has also completed development courses at other institutions including: Law for Community Organizers and Developers, De Paul University's College of Law; Video Tape for Social Action and Service, Loop College; and several management courses at the Illinois Management Training Institute.

Joe belongs to numerous professional organizations including the American Planning Association, American Society for Public Administration, National Association of Social Workers and National Council of University Research Administrators.

It's easy to detect that Joe is interested in planning and providing services that promote the well-being of other individuals. He is not just interested on a local or regional level, his concerns are also international. Joe is active in developing intercultural relations. As vice-president of the Advisory Council of Crossroads, a Chicago international student center which sponsors debates, discussions and social festivities, Joe works with international students out of the Hyde Park area. He is also a member of the International Visitors Center of Chicago and hosts visitors from other countries. "I'm constantly amazed at the number of people who take pictures of our bathroom," Joe commented, adding that it is, perhaps, because they use space differently in their countries. Joe and his wife, Mary Jo, who has lived and studied in Japan, have hosted four generations of the same Japanese family. The Furgals have traveled to Japan, Hawaii and Mexico during the past three years. Mary Jo, a librarian, has also studied in Hawaii. Joe credits his "Uncle Samuel" with providing his living expenses and experiences in West Germany and Viet Nam. A Communications Security Supervisor in the U.S. Army, he has also traveled in Western Europe and Malaysia.

Joe expects his future to include both community developing and international relations, possibly working in communities with deprived populations in want of developing skills needed to exercise control over their lives. He enjoys teaching and providing opportunities to help others open doors through self-development. "I see my job as helping other people do their thing," Joe explained. Whether students, international visitors or CETA-supported staff, Joe seems to give his all to help others give theirs.
