The Whitaker Study

"Rape is not a crime of passion," said Dr. Sandra Whitaker, GSU professor of psychology. "Rape is a form of aggression based on unresolved emotional problems."

In Whitaker's recently completed study, "Emotional Needs and Attitudes of Police and Hospital Personnel Dealing with Rape," several surprises were found. "There were three surprises in my findings," said Whitaker. "First, both police and hospital workers admitted they lacked training in dealing with rape victims. Secondly, both groups expressed a desire to receive such training. The most surprising discovery was that the attitudinal differences between hospital and police personnel are minor."

Dr. Whitaker described the hospitals as more sympathetic to the victim and more willing to help the rape victim deal with her emotional problems. Hospital workers participating in the study expressed a need for information on referral services to help the victim and her family.

Police personnel, on the other hand, wanted training on the processing of rape as a police complaint. "They expressed no need for special training because they do not view rape as being different from any other crime," said Dr. Whitaker.

"Rape is the only crime where the victim is guilty," said Joan Healy, criminologist and assistant to Whitaker. Healy described rape victims as people who are "raped repeatedly, by societal, police, hospital and family attitudes" toward them. "Historically, women are part of the spoils of war and the conqueror," Healy said. "One of the first things an invading army does is rape the women."

Whitaker and Healy found that both police and hospital personnel advised women to resist an attacker. The most recommended methods of resistance were screaming and kicking.

Dr. Whitaker's study involved nine hospitals and four police departments in the south suburbs.

Seven rape victims were interviewed in this study. The researchers described them as "extremely reluctant to talk and unassertive." Some would only talk to the interviewers on the phone. Whitaker said the rape victim can experience a variety of problems and recommended counseling for the victim and her family.

Whitaker said the YWCA was doing a superior job of helping rape victims. She also gave rape "hotlines" high praise. The "hotlines" will provide over-the-phone counseling and accompany the victim to the hospital if asked, said Whitaker.

Whitaker said the most important outcome of this study should be to help police departments and hospitals select and train personnel that can work with rape victims effectively.

Healy and Whitaker hope the study will help bring about several changes for hospital and police personnel. "I would like to see workshops for police and hospital personnel where there is a chance to talk to rape victims," said Whitaker. Whitaker believes role-playing, where a hospital or police worker would play the role of a rape victim, would make the workers more sympathetic to the victims' problems.

Whitaker hopes there will be other results of her study, too. Raising people's awareness about the crime of rape is one of those hopes. She also hopes to see a listing of social service agencies made available to police departments so they can help rape victims find emotional counseling. "Ideally, a hospital would have a psychiatric unit with someone available for crisis intervention when a rape victim comes to the hospital," Whitaker said. Hospital workers could also use more knowledge of laws dealing with the crime of rape and the victim's rights, she said.
