DOUGLAS TO LEAVE GSU . . .

Dr. Donald Douglas, Acting Associate Vice President for Research and one of the original faculty members at GSU, has been appointed Provost of the State of New York University, College at Brockton. He and his family will be moving to the new location during the



first week of September. As the chief academic officer of the 9,500-student liberal arts college, Dr. Douglas will be in charge of 485 faculty members. He came to GSU as one of the directors of academic development in August, 1970, and has played many roles in the continuing advancement of the University. A University Professor since 1971, he also has served as health science coordinator, science coordinator, Chairman of the Council of Faculties and assistant, acting and associate dean of EAS.

The Student Activities unit is sponsoring a "Registration Break," August 27-31, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Video tapes will be shown on the careers of Muhammed Ali and the Beatles continuously in Engbretson Hall, the cafeteria, and the Hall of Governors. "2 + 2" GETS UNDERWAY . . . GSU and five two-year community colleges have signed agreements which will allow junior college students who have obtained the associate degree in a wide variety of business programs to transfer smoothly into an appropriate under division program in GSU's College of Business and Public Administration and earn a bachelor's degree, according to Dr. Robert L. Milam, Dean of the College.

Commonly known as the "2 + 2 program," the agreements assure the junior college student, who has taken a specific business career path, that he/she will be able to continue that path at GSU and earn a bachelor's degree in the equivalent of two full academic years.

Agreements have been signed between GSU and Prairie State College (10 programs), Thornton Community College (10 programs), Moraine Valley Community College (15 programs), Joliet Junior College (14 programs) and Kankakee Community College (10 programs). All are effective with the fall terms at the respective schools and GSU.

Cooperative programs between GSU and several community colleges in fields other than business also are being developed.
