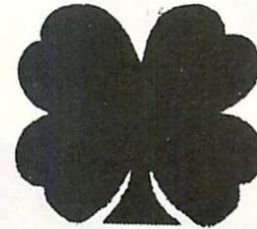

SPECIAL WORKSHOP PLANNED . . . The Office of Bilingual-Multicultural Education at GSU will sponsor a free workshop on "The Growth of a City and Its People," Monday, March 17, 4:45-8 p.m., in Engbretson Hall. Professor William Adelman, of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations at the University of Illinois-Circle Campus, will present a lecture and slide presentation. Adelman is also vice president of the Illinois Historical Society and author of Haymarket Revisited. The public is invited to attend.

CONTEMPORARY LECTURE FORUM . . . Joseph Sorrentino, attorney at law and Judge Pro Tem in Los Angeles, California, will be on the GSU campus for the Contemporary Lecture Forum at 8 p.m., Friday, March 28, in Engbretson Hall. Sorrentino has been called one of the most stirring speakers on the American scene today. F. Lee Bailey has called him the "best juvenile judge in the world." THIRD WORLD EXCHANGE . . . Approximately 200 scholars--from Canada, the Caribbean, the Middle East, Latin America, Africa, the United Kingdom, and the United States--are expected to present papers at GSU's sixth annual Third World Conference scheduled for March 26-29, at the Conrad Hilton Hotel in Chicago. A total of 35 panels, three plenary sessions, and one major workshop have been organized for the four-day event. "Global Inequality: Implications for the 1980's and Beyond" is the theme of this year's conference which is being convened by the Intercultural Studies faculty. The conference, offered for undergraduate and graduate credit, is designed to promote a spirited exchange of ideas among scholars, students and the public on the myriad problems confronting third world societies and peoples.
