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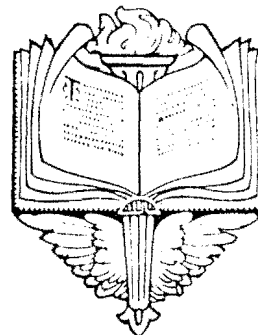

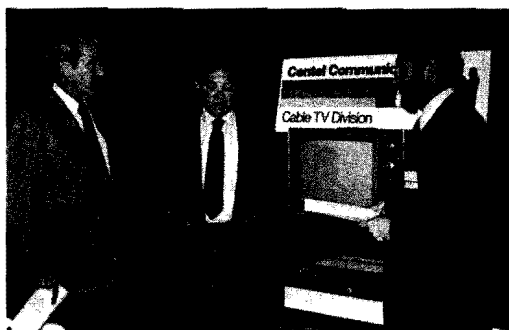

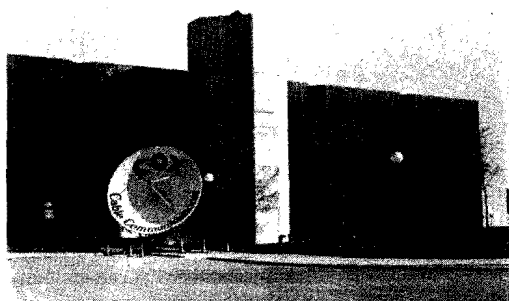

Faculty Fulbright Opportunities Abroad

The Council for International Exchange of Scholars has announced an extension of the application deadline for faculty members (in the fields of American literature and studies, business and economics, science and engineering, linguistics and teaching English as a foreign language) interested in teaching in Africa, Asia, Eastern Europe and Latin America. An insufficient number of applications has been received for certain countries in these areas. Travel Only applications for France, Germany and Italy may be received until February 1, 1981, for the 1981-82 academic year. Due dates for the 1982-83 program of teaching and research awards for Australia, New Zealand and the American Republics will be June 1, 1981; and for Africa, Asia and Europe, the due date is July 1, 1981. Although due dates for 1982-83 awards are many months away, faculty members should begin to consider the possibilities of teaching or research abroad at this time. Approximately 75 percent of awards will be for teaching, 25 percent for research.

Eligibility Requirements include United States citizenship at the time of application; for lecturing--usually postdoctoral university lecturing experience in the field of application; for research--a doctorate at the time of application or comparable professional qualifications; in some cases, proficiency in a foreign language. Full awards generally consist of a maintenance allowance for grantee and family, roundtrip travel for the grantee and usually a principal dependent, and a modest incidental allowance. The size of awards varies from country to country. Only one application may be filed in an annual competition, but applicants may name up to three alternative countries.

Fulbright Grants in Foreign Student Exchange Administration: The Fulbright Commission in Germany has announced 20 Senior awards for American educators of substantial professional achievement in the area of foreign student advisement and admission (university foreign student advisors and other officials whose current responsibilities are directly related to issues of foreign student exchange). The awards are tenable in the spring of 1981 for a three-week period and include roundtrip travel and travel within Germany, \$50 per diem and a \$250 incidental allowance. The deadline for application to the Council for International Exchange of Scholars is December 1, 1980.

Faculty Registers for Service Abroad: Two separate registers are maintained for faculty members interested in lecturing research or service abroad. In the first, the Council for International Exchange of Scholars administers a computerized Register of American Scholars, creative artists and other professionals who are interested in lecturing and research appointments abroad

for an academic year or a semester. Registrants are sent annual spring announcements of opportunities under the senior Fulbright program and, occasionally information about opportunities under other programs. They are also sometimes asked about their interest in a specific opening which has become available.

In the second, faculty members may have their names included in the Register for International Service in Education (RISE), a computer-based referral service which will enable universities, technical institutes, research centers and government education ministries and agencies outside the United States to locate qualified educators, specialists, researchers and consultants for education-related assignments, ranging in duration from a few weeks to as long as several years. Through RISE, countries can match their needs with the qualifications of American teachers and specialists available for education-related assignments abroad. Its primary focus is on developing countries which seek expertise in such areas as banking and finance, business, public administration, economics, engineering, health care professions, the social sciences, the physical and life sciences and teacher education. RISE will provide the relevant biographical data (specializations, language competence, career experience, etc.) to facilitate the matching process. 1981 will be the program's pilot year.
