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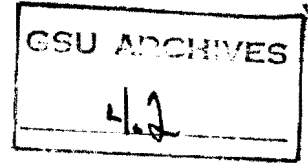
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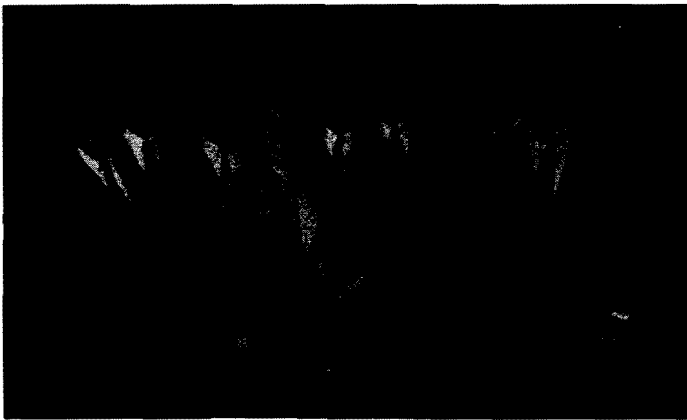

GSU HONORS MAJOR DONORS... Sixty-four individuals and organizations who made major gifts to GSU during 1980 were honored recently at a dinner hosted by the GSU Foundation. Sixteen of the honorees were named Governors Associates in recognition of gifts in cash or in kind in excess of \$1,000. Forty-eight were named to the President's Club for donations between \$250 and \$999. William Dodd, chief executive officer of the Foundation, reported that income from private sources in 1980 totaled \$117,766.

FACULTY EXCHANGE PROJECT ANNOUNCED . . . 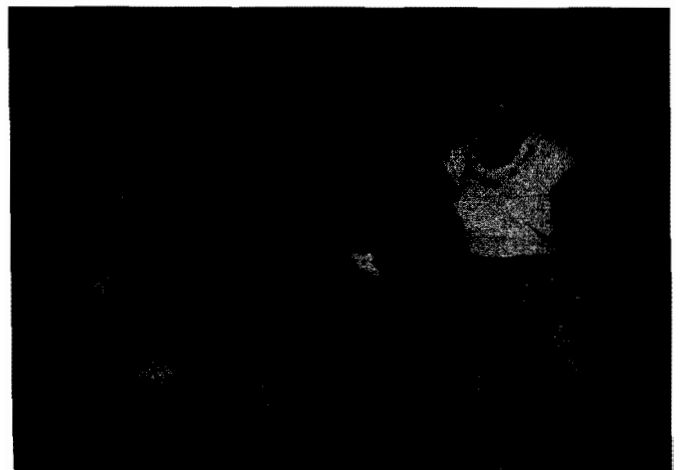

GSU RECEIVES GIFT OF AFRICAN ARTIFACTS . . . Twelve African artifacts valued at \$8,650 have been donated to GSU by a private collector from Indianapolis, according to William Dodd, chief executive officer of the GSU Foundation. The artifacts will become part of the University's permanent art collection, but their greatest value will be as study pieces in the courses taught by Arthur P. Bourgeois, CAS art professor, on African art. He arranged for the gift through Theodore Celenko, Jr., a former classmate and currently curator of the Harrison Eiteljorg Collection of Ethnographic Art in Indianapolis. Celenko told Eiteljorg, a private collector, of the University's need for such teaching materials, and he agreed to the donation. Pieces representing the art and culture of various peoples from Nigeria, Cameroon, Mali, Zaire and Ivory Coast were chosen. Included are several masks, figures, a staff, bowls and a cup. Most are wood carvings decorated with pigments, but the cup is made from the horn of a buffalo. The artifacts will be on display in the near future in the Visual Arts Gallery.

POSITIONS OPEN . . . The Office of Student Development has two graduate assistantships to be filled by qualified personnel. Job responsibilities will include: locating, ordering, and indexing occupational information; developing a resource pool of speakers, materials, research, etc., related to adult career development and mid-life career change; talking to students with career concerns. Some typing will be involved. Necessary qualifications for these positions are: ability to organize and work with close attention to detail; good research and writing skills; good interpersonal skills; light typing skills; interest in the field of career development preferred. GRADUATE ASSISTANTSHIPS AVAILABLE IN DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY . . . GSU's Dept. of Public Safety is looking for qualified people to fill graduate assistantship positions. Responsibilities will be the following: report to the Director of Public Safety; assist in the implementation of occupational awareness and recruitment activities for vocations in the area of law enforcement; participate in on-the-job training in basic campus police operations including assisting DPS watch supervisors on day, afternoon, and midnight shifts; serve as Research Assistant in the collection of significant data on personal safety awareness and procedures at GSU including disseminating surveys, conducting personal interviews and reviewing the literature on public safety; submit two reports based on knowledge gained in campus police operations and analyse data gathered in the research of public safety awareness at GSU. Develop

conclusions and make recommendations for change and improvement based on research results. Qualifications needed are: good writing and communication skills; basic familiarization with standard research/statistical tools; prefer career interest in criminal justice field; good academic standing; and a graduate student registered for 6 hours each Trimester. The starting date will be March 16, 1981. Application for Graduate Assistantship can be obtained from the Dept. of Public Safety Office. Deadline for submitting applications is March 14, 1981.

NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION HAS OPEN POSITIONS . . . The NSF Division of Mathematical and Computer Sciences has available positions for program directors in the Computer Science Section. These are one or two-year rotational positions. Salaries are negotiable. Applicants should have a Ph.D. or equivalent experience and training in an appropriate field, plus six years of successful scientific research experience. A broad general knowledge of the field and some administrative experience are also required... The Division of Ocean Sciences is seeking candidates for program director in the Physical Oceanography program. The position will be filled on a one or two-year rotational basis with a salary range from \$37,871 to \$50,112 depending on qualifications and experience. The program provides support for fundamental research in physical oceanography. Applicants should have a Ph.D. in physical oceanography or a related physical science, or the equivalent, plus at least three years of specialized experience in physical oceanography.
