PRESIDENT'S CONCERT . . . The Second Annual
President's Concert at GSU on May 5 at
7:30 p.m. will again feature music by the
GSU String Quartet. The concert, a benefit
for the University's Community College
Scholarship Fund, will include music of
Beethoven, Brahms, Mozart and Wolf. Guest
artist will be world famous concert pianist,
Grant Johannesen. Initiated last May as the
major fund-raiser of the year, the first
President's Concert brought in approximately
\$5,000 from ticket sales. Currently, twelve
top graduates of seven community colleges
are attending GSU under the scholarship
program.



ACTING DEAN OF SPECIAL PROGRAMS NAMED . . .
Barbara Smith has been named acting dean of
Special Programs and Continuing Education at
GSU effective May 1. Formerly assistant
dean, she succeeds Richard Vorwerk, who
resigned as dean to return to teaching in
the College of Business and Public Adminis-
tration. Smith joined the University staff
in 1974 as head of public services in the
library. She held numerous positions in
what was then called the learning resources
center until her appointment in 1979 to
Special Programs. Smith earned the M.A. in
library science at the University of Denver
in 1953. She has held positions in the
libraries of the University of Chicago,
Chicago State University, the City Hall of
Hong Kong and University of Denver and the
Cincinnati, Ohio, public library. She also
has taught library science at the University
of Denver and University of Washington.

FULBRIGHT LECTURING AND RESEARCH AWARDS . . . Applications for Fulbright lecturing and research awards are now being taken for the 1982-83 academic year. The deadline for Latin America, Australia and New Zealand is June 1, 1981, and for Africa, Asia and Europe July 1, 1981. The competition is open to faculty members with American citizenship who possess a doctorate or comparable professional qualifications. In some cases, proficiency in a foreign language is required. Only one application may be filed in an annual competition, but applicants may name up to three alternative countries. Awards include round-trip travel for the grantee, a maintenance allowance to cover basic living costs of the grantee and family while living abroad, and a small incidental allowance for travel, books and services essential to the assignment. AFRICAN ARTIFACTS ON DISPLAY . . . The GSU permanent collection of African artifacts will be displayed in the Visual Arts Gallery from now through May 14. The public is invited to see these unusual pieces from 10:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. There are thirteen items in the collection, which represents the art and culture of various peoples from Nigeria, Cameroon, Mali, Zaire and Ivory Coast. They are valued at \$8,650. Dr. Arthur Bourgeois uses them as educational materials in African art classes.

GSU JAZZ FEST . . . GSU's Tenth Annual Community College Jazz Festival will be held on May 2 beginning at 9:00 a.m. and continuing throughout the day and evening in the GSU Theatre. Jazz musicians from six community colleges will vie for best class awards. Highlighting the event will be a jam session following the judging. Guest artists are Chico Freeman on sax, Joseph Zingale on trumpet and Richard Davis on bass, assisted by GSU's Warrick Carter on percussion and Ken Chaney on piano. The public is invited free of charge.

WOMAN ATTORNEY TO SPEAK AT GSU . . . Sheila M. Murphy, Chicago lawyer who specializes in public interest cases with women, will be the guest speaker at the monthly brown bag lunch of the Women's Resource Center in Engbretson Hall at GSU on May 7. Murphy was the defense lawyer for Wanda Brandstetter, who was recently accused of bribing an Illinois state legislator to support the Equal Rights Amendment. She is a partner in the local office of the law firm of Murphy, Morris & Susemihl of Colorado Springs, Colo. The 12:00 noon lecture is free to the public.

TRAINING SEMINARS FOR TOWNSHIP OFFICIALS . . .
