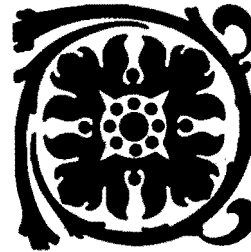

FACULTY SENATE . . . The faculty senate election of April 27-29 named Peter Gunther, Helen Hughes, Barbara Jenkins, R.E. Kelley, Larry McClellan, Joe Meredith, George Michel, Michael Purdy, William Toner, Kenneth Wieg, Lon Wolf and Linda Zieman to the faculty senate for two-year terms to fill vacancies which will occur at the end of this academic year. Doris Johnson was elected to a three-year term as a non-voting member of the Board of Higher Education. Alma Walker-Vinyard was elected to the Board of Governors Council of Faculties, also for three years. Their alternates, respectively, will be Don Herzog and Louis Mulé. Senate president, Robert Press, plans to convene a meeting of the senators-elect and the continuing two-year term incumbents in order to elect officers for the new senate this fall. The meeting will be held on May 21 at 1:00 p.m. in the WEE Conference Hall.

COMMENCEMENT . . . Faculty academic attire for the Commencement Ceremony on June 6 or 7 may be ordered through the Bookstore no later than May 13. ACADEMIC CONVOCATION . . . An academic convocation is being called by President Leo Goodman-Malamuth for Thursday, May 21, 10:00 to 11:00 a.m. in Engbretson Hall. Provost Curtis L. McCray will address the convocation on the state of the University generally and on a number of specific topics.

ALTERNATIVE HEALTH CARE CONFAB . . .

Dr. Robert S. Mendelsohn, well-known physician and author, will head a list of 16 speakers and panelists at a two-day conference on Alternative Approaches to Health Care to be held at GSU on May 22-23. Proponents of non-traditional methods of obtaining and maintaining good health will lecture, demonstrate and discuss such approaches as chronic pain management, imagery, wholistic health centers, reflexology, osteopathy, self-help groups, self-hypnosis, nutrition and various others. Dr. Mendelsohn will be the keynote speaker at the 9:30 a.m. opening session on May 22. He is the nationally syndicated columnist of "The People's Doctor." He has a private practice in pediatrics and is affiliated with St. Frances Hospital, Evanston, and Michael Reese Medical Center in Chicago. While GSU is offering the conference primarily as a public service, it is also available for one hour of college credit on the undergraduate or graduate level. Students must attend both days and complete class assignments to qualify for credit. Reservation deadline for non-credit participation is May 18.
